I have been a teacher for 20 years, and have watched and experienced the dismantling of public education for the entirety of my career. When I began teaching in 2003, we were in the throes of "No Child Left Behind." The sad part was that it actually DID leave children behind by forcing teachers to teach to a test, disregarding the fact that learning is never linear, nor on a fixed time line.

Our students experienced constant testing, and teachers were working in fear of losing funding for our schools of students didn't "perform" on the one test. We all knew, and still know, that one test can NEVER give us the entire picture of someone's learning.

Now, I have watched my home state of Missouri fiercely dismantle their public school systems and I am watching it happen here. HB 2218 takes public funds and gives them to private schools. Private schools are not required to accept ALL students, are not held accountable to the same educational standards, nor are they required to hire qualified teachers with certifications and training.

Bonner Springs is a very low income Title One school with a lot of special needs students as well as ESOL students. We are a small suburb of the Kansas City area with 1 preschool, 3 elementary schools, 1 middle school, and 1 highschool. My school, Bonner Springs Elementary, is truly a treasure hidden in the KC area, not because of material things but because of our staff and students. I am writing to express my opposition to HB 2218. Being a public educator is one of the most difficult jobs that a person can choose to do! It is a calling and takes more perseverance than one can imagine. Having been part of the 2022 Kansas Teacher of the Year team, we were given the opportunity to travel around Kansas and visit a great deal of school districts in various economic states, including urban, suburban, and rural. Kansas schools are some of the best schools in the country and Kansas has always been a leader in education. Public schools by definition are open to **ALL** students... which is the way it should be! All students have a right to a quality education. In order to accomplish this expectation, funding needs to be provided to those schools in order to function, not only minimally, but in order to truly thrive. Funding has been at a deficit in education for years and is a constant discussion point in the government as well. We, as public educators, open our doors and hearts to every student who comes to us, from whatever situation they have been given. My past principal always stated that parents give us the best kids they have! As a result this means public education includes severe special needs, behavioral needs, social emotional needs, mental health needs, academic needs, language acquisition needs, poverty needs, and much, much more! - There are no oversight provisions in Bill HB 2218, and it has no mechanism to evaluate the progress and achievement of students receiving public funds to attend private or home schools.
- Voucher programs do not provide enough money for low income students to attend
 private schools. Tuition at many private schools is greater than the amount covered by
 Education Savings Accounts, leaving out those students without the means to make up
 the difference or who don't have reliable transportation. Meanwhile, funding for their
 neighborhood school is drained.

- Research continues to show that <u>private school vouchers do not improve student</u> <u>achievement.</u>

Chairman Williams and members of the Committee,

Thank you for the opportunity to submit this written testimony in opposition to House Bill 2218

My name is Ron Hobert, and I am the president of the American Federation of Teachers – Kansas. I have also worked for over 30 years as an educator, both in public schools at USD 259 in Wichita and in private schools at the Catholic Diocese of Wichita. I am testifying today as both a representative of the thousands of public employees, parents, and Kansans that AFT Kansas serves, and as a dedicated and passionate teacher committed to providing our students with the best education possible. That is why I am testifying in opposition to this bill, HB 2218

Educators, parents, students, lawmakers and Kansans taxpayers all want to give our kids a high-quality, accountable education so our students can thrive and excel to become productive citizens. I also would hope that all of us agree that we should not be wasting state funds—and children and educator's time on flawed and failed educational program called vouches. I believe expanding the state's voucher program would waste tax-payer dollars on a costly program that has not proven to improve academic outcomes for students

While some would have you believe that vouchers are a salve to the challenges facing our schools, there is ample evidence, from more than a dozen research-based studies, evaluations, and reports of existing voucher programs throughout the country conducted over the last 20 years that show, unequivocally, that vouchers *do not improve* student outcomes. Let me highlight just a few examples:

- Back in 2008, the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago said the best research to date finds relatively small achievement gains for voucher students, most of which are not statistically different from zero.
- A 2016 <u>study of the Ohio private school program</u>, which is targeted to students from low-performing schools or who are economically disadvantaged, conducted by one of the foremost *conservative* think tanks—the Thomas Fordham Institute and funded by the *pro-voucher* Walton Foundation—found voucher

students have "fared worse academically compared to their closely matched peers attending public schools ... and that such impacts also appear to persist over time."

- A 2018 <u>longitudinal study of the Indiana Choice Scholarship Program</u> found that low-income students
 who switched from public to private school using a voucher starting in the 2011-12 school year
 experienced *worsening* math achievement throughout their time using the vouchers, compared to students
 who remained in public school.
- A 2019 <u>study published in the Russel Sage Foundation Journal of the Social Sciences</u> found significant losses in academic achievement for Indiana students who used a voucher to move from public to private school.
- And a 2019 <u>study on the Louisiana voucher program</u> found that after four years, voucher students performed *noticeably worse* on state assessments than their public school counterparts.

These examples of research should be extremely sobering for anyone considering expanding voucher programs in Kansas. We can and must do better for our Kansas kids. Because, in the end, what matters most is the students.

While some want you to believe vouchers are a magic salve, they are not what parents and voters want. The American Federation of Teachers just released a nationwide survey of parents and voters to examine their education priorities. By an overwhelming 80 percent to 20 percent margin, parents and voters said they want policymakers—like you—to focus on improving education in the public schools rather than expanding school choice.

- Their top priorities for public schools include developing students' fundamental skills in reading, math and science; ensuring all kids, regardless of background, have an opportunity to succeed; developing critical-thinking and reasoning skills; teaching practical life skills; and preparing students to succeed in college or careers.
- They also said policymakers and schools should address staff shortages, reducing class size and improving literacy skills.
- That is because these are the things that will really make a difference in students' lives.

Let me also note, a lot has been made about the academic performance of students following the impact of the coronavirus pandemic on student outcomes. But a recent review of research on vouchers shows their impact on students is far worse than the pandemic itself. Michigan State University Professor of Education Josh Cowen has found that the impact of vouchers on student outcomes are as disastrous for students as natural disasters, similar to the impact of Hurricane Katrina on student achievement in Louisiana in 2005.

I believe in following the research and you should open your mind to these research facts:

- Private school vouchers do not save taxpayer money.
- Private school vouchers give choice to private schools, not parents.
- Private school vouchers do not offer supports or legal protections to vulnerable students.
- Private school vouchers do not work in rural areas.

- Private school vouchers lack transparency and accountability. On the KS program's website, it says: "Kansas' tax-credit scholarship program generally avoids unnecessary and counterproductive regulations."
- When vouchers are on the ballot, American voters reject them, and usually by
 overwhelming margins. Since 1970, voters have rejected the creation or expansion of
 private school vouchers every time they have been proposed on ballot referenda—a total
 of fourteen separate instances. These voucher initiatives rarely garner even 35% of votes
 in their favor.

The State Legislature would do right by our students by giving them what they really need and what parents and voters support. Our public schools need to be well-funded and well-resourced to address the teacher shortage impacting classrooms across the county. Legislators should invest in public school buildings and mental health supports for children recovering from the global pandemic. Legislators should hear parent voices who want public schools where kids want to go, parents want to send their kids and where kids can thrive and be prepared for college, careers, and life. Expanding the state voucher program would not accomplish any of these goals.

Again, AFT Kansas strongly opposes any type of voucher or tax-credit legislation.

However, if they have the right to deny a child attendance, they should in no way be receiving public tax dollars.

Public tax dollars should be for the public good. Public tax dollars should not be used to fund schools that deny admission. Public tax dollars should not be diverted to private schools. Private schools do not have the same state requirements and accountability that public schools do. Public schools educate all Kansas students regardless of academic ability, physical ability, religion, and sexual orientation.

Madam Chair, Members of the Committee:

It is my great honor to serve on the Board of Education for the Eudora USD491 Schools. This testimony is my own. I do not speak for the school district or the board as a whole, and this testimony should not be construed as the will of that board. I submit my testimony in opposition to HB2218 out of concern for the wellbeing of the students in Kansas schools and the good stewardship of Kansas tax dollars.

A central role of local boards of education in Kansas is the responsibility to establish a system of free public education for *all* residents of that district. Public schools do not choose their students. Public school students are not excluded due to their educational needs or abilities, religion, socioeconomic status, sexual orientation, or any of the other many criteria a private school can utilize in selectively admitting or excluding students. Public schools are for the benefit of *all*, and are subject to a high degree of government oversite and operational standards.

HB2218 specifically stipulates that, "Sec. 13. Nothing in this act shall be construed to permit any governmental agency to exercise control or supervision over any nonpublic school or home school." If private schools are free of public control or supervision, why should they be entitled to public tax dollars? I have no doubt that there are good private schools in Kansas, but they simply are not held to the same high standards as Kansas public schools, do not fulfill the same public service as Kansas public schools, and are not entitled to the public funds that support the fulfillment of that obligation.

HB2218 affirms that, "all children shall receive what they need educationally regardless of their socioeconomic, racial or cultural status" but does not stipulate that private schools who accept tax dollars from the sunflower education equity scholarship fund are required to admit and retain all students regardless of their socioeconomic, racial or cultural status. While the language of HB2218 claims to ensure, "educational equity" and "educational freedom" it does not require that the private schools receiving the funds provide free or equitable access to their programs.

At this time, HB2218 does not have a fiscal note published, but similar programs in other states provide convincing evidence of the disastrous impact it is likely to have on our state's general fund. In Arizona, 2022 legislation authorized universal enrollment in the "Empowerment Scholarship Account" program, which is now expected to balloon to \$425 million in increased government spending by next year⁸, many times the original expected cost of \$64.5 million⁷, contributing to the state's "economic uncertainty".⁸

HB2218 also promotes a false generalization that students are better served in private schools than in accredited public schools. Research shows that private schools do not categorically outperform public schools academically. In reality, Kansas schools have proven to be highly efficient, high performing, and adhere to the "Rose Capacities" that have been endorsed by this legislature and the Kansas Supreme Court. Kansas schools currently rank 10th in the U.S. when utilizing measures from the State Board of Education's Kansans Can program. To the best of my knowledge, no evidence has been offered that shows students participating in the existing Tax Credit Scholarship Program show statistically better outcomes than students in Kansas public schools. The data just does not support the generalized implication that Kansas public schools are failing students, or that diverting funds from public schools to private schools leads to improved outcomes for either student set.

In conclusion, HB2218 is fiscally irresponsible. HB2218 is not equitable. HB2218 diverts public tax dollars away from high performing, highly regulated public schools to private programs without similar oversite or stringent standards, and with no evidence-based benefit to students. The diversion of these tax dollars undermines the duty I am bound to, as a school board member, to provide an adequate and equitable free public education for all residents of my district. I urge you to oppose HB2218.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony. I stand as an opponent to House Bill 2218. Fort Larned is a rural school district with an enrollment of 862 PK-12 as of February 2, 2023. We are located in south central Kansas and are comprised mainly of Pawnee County and the western section of Barton County Due to USD 495's rural setting, our public school can be called the centerpiece of our community.

The additional funding to private sectors would be detrimental to public education and rural districts will suffer tremendously from the effects of HB 2218. Ultimately, we fear that our student's well-being could be compromised due to equal funding and inequal scrutiny of standards, policies, and accountability. Non-accredited education cannot be considered equal to accredited education for many reasons, but especially the inability to correlate success between the two.

In addition to the inequity of students, there is also inequities in the accountability standards when it comes to educators. In our district's strategic plan, we focus on recruiting, supporting, and retaining high-quality staff members and is a significant priority to USD 495. Non-accredited students cannot be promised the same level of education because the accountability standards for educators do not match those of accredited students.

USD 495 provides many avenues of support for our students; such as, additional educational opportunities, interventions, and evidence-based instruction to assist them in working towards proficient State Board of Education outcomes.

I respectfully ask that while you consider publicly funding outside of public education, that we keep our student's well-being in mind, as well as the long-term effects it would cause for rural school districts like ours. Dear Chair Williams & members of the committee,

I am writing to voice my opposition to bill HB2218.

I oppose this bill for a number of reasons:

- As a parent of elementary and middle school children, and as a homeowner, I believe we should be
 doing all we can to strengthen Kansas' neighborhood public schools. Going back to the 1830s,
 American leaders like Horace Mann recognized that investing in public education would benefit
 entire communities by creating literate, moral and productive citizens.
- As a tax payer, I don't believe it is appropriate for tax dollars to be diverted to alternatives to public schools, particularly those with religious mandates. Doing so blurs the line that separates church and state.
- In my PhD program in Educational Policy and Leadership Studies, we learned that our public schools are often the hub of communities, particularly in rural areas, and I have seen this in my own experiences. When schools don't have sufficient funding to stay open, that closure has an adverse impact on the economic health and vibrancy of communities. This bill would exacerbate that effect by leaving all communities with public schools which are further underfunded, therefore able to support fewer employees, leading to more crowded classes, and lowering property values in the process.
- As a former special education teacher, I often had to choose between spending my own salary on
 purchasing items my students needed for their learning, or watching them go without. Instead of
 taking taxpayer dollars and diverting them to alternatives to public schools, which are not required
 to provide special education students with the same legal protections as public schools, I believe
 your committee should be laser-focused on providing full funding for special education,
 particularly while we have a budget surplus.
- As a former home school student, I have empathy for families who choose that route because their public school isn't working for them, and they have additional expenses as a result. That mirrors my own experience, and it was a challenge for my low-income family to make it work. But let's be clear: that is a choice that family is making. I should not be expected to subsidize their choice, particularly when we can see that similar legislation in other states has led to reported

<u>widespread misuse of funds</u>, and there is no required oversight to ensure that our tax dollars are used to successfully achieve measurable educational outcomes, as public schools are required to do.

I continue to be flummoxed as to why your committee is working so diligently to remove funding from our public schools, in favor of alternatives that lack educational oversight, don't provide legal protections for students with disabilities, and which will serve to exacerbate existing shortcomings in our public education system. For these reasons, I oppose HB2218.

Dear Chair & Members of the Committee,

I am writing to voice my opposition to bill HB2218. Voucher programs take scarce funding from public schools, which serve 90 percent of students, and give it to private schools that are not accountable to taxpayers. There are no stipulations that require private schools to accept all children. Public schools accept every child and provide an education with accommodations based on their needs and directed by their IEP.

Are there other areas in our state government that allow public funds to be redirected to private entities based on the public's choice? Can a KanCare recipient receive a voucher to purchase health insurance from a private health insurance company? Can a Kansan that is unsatisfied with the service from the KBI or Kansas Highway Patrol receive a voucher to hire their own private investigator? I have a child who is currently attending the University of Kansas. If she feels she could receive a better education at a smaller private university, could she receive a voucher to offset the higher cost? Public funds improve our community making it a better place to live and should stay with the public.

Voucher students have been found to underperform public-school students in many states, including Ohio, Louisiana, Indiana, & Washington, D.C. Researchers have found that private schools offer less instructional time causing their students to test lower than students attending public schools. Boser, Benner, & Roth. Our publicly funded schools follow state guidelines and curriculum standards. Private schools do not have the same state-mandated requirements for accountability and transparency. This bill isn't good for students, taxpayers, or our democratic community.

I am writing to voice my strong opposition to bill HB2218.

I am a third generation Kansan, born and raised in Newton. I currently reside in Prairie Village and am a proud parent of a public-school graduate. My husband (also a native Kansan) and I made a very conscious decision to raise our daughter in the Kansas public school system. This decision was based on the strong public education we received growing up in Newton. I am also a Pediatric Occupational Therapist (OT) and provided therapy services for over 27 years to children identified with special needs. I served children in public schools and clinical settings. I remember Newton Public School District (USD 373) having a very comprehensive special education program and students from all over the county attended. I remember sitting side-by-side with these amazing students. Those experiences influenced my decision to become a Pediatric OT and I am a better person for it.

I am grateful for the first Federal Law that guaranteed a free and appropriate public education for ALL students in 1972 (Education for All Handicapped Children Act). This law became the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act in 1990. Without these laws and funding for these laws, we literally leave many, many children behind. Private schools, parochial schools, and home schools are exempt from the federal laws that protect and educate our most vulnerable children. When public tax dollars are taken away from these programs, children and their families suffer. Plain and simple. I know. I have witnessed it. I worked with many children that were struggling in their private and parochial schools because they were not receiving the accommodations or appropriate therapy services that would allow them to succeed in the classroom. Parents struggled to pay for private services. And those who could not afford it, had no choice but to let their child suffer in the classroom or be kicked out of the private or parochial school. Private, parochial, and home schools that are exempt from Federal Laws and choose which children they want to serve *should not* receive our public dollars.

Instead of funding private, parochial, and home schools, the legislature should focus on fully funding special education. Additionally, Education Savings Accounts are not available to rural students. Distinguished Chair, Members of the Committee:

I am writing to voice my opposition to **House Bill 2218**. The creation of education savings accounts for students, while well-intentioned, will have a devastating effect on the funding and quality of public schools in Kansas. In this testimony I will outline evidence of widespread fraud and mismanagement in states with similar programs, poor performance outcomes for students, and the malicious historical motivations for education savings/vouchers and modern libertarian goals to end public education in America.

Firstly, there will be **widespread fraud and mismanagement** with education savings accounts. It is impossible for one treasurer to effectively monitor and manage the distribution of funds to multiple accounts. Furthermore, there is no way to guarantee that the funds will be used for educational expenses as intended. There are several examples of how education savings accounts have been misspent or where fraud has been rampant in states where they have been implemented. Here are a few:

- 1. Arizona: A 2020 investigation by the Arizona Republic found widespread misuse of funds in the state's education savings account program, including purchases of luxury goods, vacations, and other items that had nothing to do with education.
- 2. Florida: A 2018 investigation by the Miami Herald found that millions of dollars in education savings account funds had been spent on private schools that were not accredited, lacked state certification, or had other problems.
- 3. Mississippi: A 2016 investigation by the Clarion Ledger found that millions of dollars in education savings account funds were being spent on homeschooling materials, private schools, and other expenses that had nothing to do with education.

This is a clear indication that these programs are not sustainable or effective in the long term.

Academic studies have consistently shown that voucher programs and **education savings accounts do not improve student performance or outcomes**. In fact, they often have the opposite effect, draining resources and talent from public schools. Research has demonstrated that public schools are more efficient and effective in utilizing taxpayer dollars to provide high-quality education to all students, regardless of their background or circumstances. There is a wealth of evidence that shows that vouchers and education savings accounts are ineffective in improving student outcomes. Here are a few examples of studies that support this:

1. A 2020 study published in the peer-reviewed Educational Evaluation and Policy Analysis journal found that students who used vouchers to attend private schools in

Louisiana had lower test scores in math and reading compared to their peers in public schools

- 2. A 2018 study conducted by the National Bureau of Economic Research found that students in the Milwaukee Parental Choice Program, which is the nation's oldest voucher program, had lower test scores in both reading and math compared to their peers in public schools.
- 3. A 2017 study published in the Journal of School Choice found that students who used vouchers in Ohio did not perform better on standardized tests than their peers in public schools.
- 4. A 2016 study by the Brookings Institution found that students who used vouchers in Washington, D.C. did not perform better on standardized tests than their peers in public schools.

These studies and others like them provide strong evidence that vouchers and education savings accounts are not an effective solution for improving student outcomes.

Many historians note the unpleasant and racist history of voucher programs in America. Nancy MacLean is William H. Chafe distinguished professor of history and public policy at Duke University and author of "Democracy in Chains: The Deep History of the Radical Right's Stealth Plan for America." She writes, "School choice had its roots in a crucial detail of the *Brown* decision: The ruling only applied to public schools. White Southerners viewed this as a loophole for evading desegregated schools.

In 1955 and 1956, conservative White leaders in Virginia devised a regionwide strategy of "massive resistance" to the high court's desegregation mandate that hinged on state-funded school vouchers. The State Board of Education provided vouchers, then called tuition grants, of \$250 (\$2,514 in 2021 dollars) to parents who wanted to keep their children from attending integrated schools. The resistance leaders understood that most Southern White families could not afford private school tuition — and many who could afford it lacked the ideological commitment to segregation to justify the cost. The vouchers, combined with private donations to the new schools in counties facing desegregation mandates, would enable all but a handful of the poorest Whites to evade compliance.

Other Southern states soon adopted voucher programs like the one in Virginia to facilitate the creation of private schools called "**segregation academies**," despite opposition from Black families and civil rights leaders. Oliver Hill, an NAACP attorney key to the Virginia case against "separate but equal" education that was folded into *Brown*, explained their position this way: "No one in a democratic society has a right to have his private prejudices financed at public expense." …

Despite such objections, key conservative and libertarian thinkers and foundations, including economists Milton Friedman and Friedrich Hayek, Human Events editor Felix Morley and publisher Henry Regnery, backed the White Southern cause. They recognized that White Southerners' push for "freedom of choice" presented an opportunity to advance their goal of

privatizing government services and resources, starting with primary and secondary education. They barely, if ever, addressed racism and segregation; instead, they spoke of freedom (implicitly, White freedom).

These conservative and libertarian thinkers offered up ostensibly race-neutral arguments in favor of the tax subsidies for private schooling sought by white supremacists. In doing so, they taught defenders of segregation a crucial new tactic — abandon overtly racist rationales and instead tout liberty, competition and market choice while embracing an anti-government stance. These race-neutral rationales for private school subsidies gave segregationists a justification that could survive court review — and did, for more than a decade before the Supreme Court ruled them unconstitutional.

[Milton] Friedman, too, was interested in far more than school choice. He and his libertarian allies saw vouchers as a temporary first step on the path to school privatization. He didn't intend for governments to subsidize private education forever. Rather, once the public schools were gone, Friedman envisioned parents eventually shouldering the full cost of private schooling without support from taxpayers. Only in some "charity" cases might governments still provide funding for tuition.

Friedman first articulated this outlook in his 1955 manifesto, but he clung to it for half a century, explaining in 2004, "In my ideal world, government would not be responsible for providing education any more than it is for providing food and clothing." Four months before his death in 2006, when he spoke to a meeting of the conservative American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC), he was especially frank. Addressing how to give parents control of their children's education, Friedman said, "The ideal way would be to abolish the public school system and eliminate all the taxes that pay for it."

Today, the ultrawealthy backers of school choice are cagey about this long-term goal, knowing that care is required to win the support of parents who want the best for their children. Indeed, in a sad irony, decades after helping to impede *Brown*'s implementation, school choice advocates on the right targeted families of color for what one libertarian legal strategist called "forging nontraditional alliances." They won over some parents of color, who came to see vouchers and charter schools as a way to escape the racial and class inequalities that stemmed from White flight out of urban centers and the Supreme Court's willingness to allow White Americans to avoid integrating schools.

But the history behind vouchers reveals that the rhetoric of "choice" and "freedom" stands in stark contrast to the real goals sought by conservative and libertarian advocates. The system they dream of would produce staggering inequalities, far more severe than the disparities that already exist today. Wealthy and upper-middle-class families would have their pick of schools, while those with far fewer resources — disproportionately families of color — might struggle to pay to educate their children, leaving them with far fewer options or dependent on private charity. Instead of offering an improvement over underfunded schools, school choice might lead to something far worse."

Private schools are typically expensive even with a savings account or voucher, making them less accessible to families with limited financial resources. This can lead to **increased socio-economic segregation**, as students from different income levels attend different types of schools. Additionally, private schools are often not required to accept all students, and **can choose to admit only those students who meet certain academic, behavioral, or religious criteria**. This can limit the diversity of student populations and create a less inclusive learning environment. For profit schools will increase their tuition if this education savings account goes into effect and in the end, families who already send their kids to private school will be the people who benefit. When state tax dollars are used to support private schools, charter schools, and online schools, resources are being taken away from the public education system. This can lead to reduced funding for public schools, making it more difficult for them to provide a quality education to all students. Tax dollars should not go to private/for-profit institutions, it is our state's duty to serve and educate every child. Research has demonstrated that public schools are more efficient and effective in utilizing taxpayer dollars to provide high-quality education to all students, regardless of their background or circumstances.

Investing in high-quality early childhood education programs is one of the most effective ways to improve public schools. Research has shown that students who receive high-quality early childhood education are more likely to succeed in school and in life. Let's improve public schools with more funding to reduce class sizes, to create a universal pre-K system, to create programs to recruit, retain and pay high quality teachers, to serve all students with IEPs, 504s and disabilities, and allow students of all socioeconomic backgrounds to go to school together. Public schools are designed to provide equal access to education for all students, regardless of their socio-economic background or family circumstances. This is a cornerstone of democratic societies, where all citizens should have equal opportunities to succeed.

In conclusion, I urge you to reconsider this education savings/voucher bill and the potential harm it may bring to public schools in Kansas. Let us focus on supporting and strengthening our public schools.

Please oppose House Bill 2218, thank you for your consideration.

Madam Chair, Members of the Committee;

I am a parent of three public school students (two former, one current). I am writing to day to express my opposition to HB 2218.

I have broken down my concerns into categories of Obligation, Access, Accountability, and Cost.

What Do We Owe Each Other?

I support this bill's proposition that parents have "the freedom to direct the education of their children." I support a parent's decision to find alternative education paths for their children. However, if a parent decides a public education is not what they want for their children am I obligated to pay for whatever other education they decide is appropriate? Even if it is not as academically rigorous as the public schools? Even if there is no public oversight or meaningful accountability? As a taxpayer, my answer is "no". As Kansans, we pay state taxes for accountable, state-provided services available to all eligible Kansans. We don't get to pick and choose which public services we pay for. If I opt out of using a service, I don't get to ask for cash back. If that were true for education, couldn't it be true for other things? For example, my local taxes pay for buses. I never ride the bus. It's too infrequent and uncomfortable. I don't like it. I prefer my car or an Uber. Just because I don't like the bus should I expect to get tax dollars back to pay for my Uber? Of course not. That's silly but not really different than what this bill is proposing. Public schools are the tax-funded option. Like buses, their cost is maintained by the community. Their use is optional but if a family doesn't want to use them, they can't expect the community to pay for a private choice.

As a taxpayer, I much prefer that my education dollars stay in programs that maximize access so all students benefit. There might be some who try to say this bill simply allows a family to use "their" education tax dollars as they see fit; that they are not *taking away* from they state, they are just taking "what's theirs." This is true in only a very few cases. Few family's 20 mil payment to the General Fund is equal to the full amount of their children's BASE aid to public education¹. If the parent is not a homeowner, they contribute less; if a family has purchased less, they generate less in sales tax. Should we all begin keeping receipts to figure out what we spent in Kansas and what the state "owes" us if we want to opt out of a state service? The dollars being used for these ESA accounts are not, in fact, the parent's money which the state *owes* them if they don't use the public schools. Each child's BASE aid comes from families and businesses all across the state who agree, as Kansans, to contribute to the public schools which are fully accountable to their communities and committees like this one. As a Kansan, I expect my General Fund education dollars to be used for the benefit of schools that serve all Kansas children in a clear, equal, and accountable way.

¹ For example, in 2022, my family's 20 mil levy for a house appraised at \$343,600 to the state general fund was \$698.28. See attached. According to the KSDE website, the 2021-22 BASE aid was \$4,706 and this school year it is \$4,846. That means this year, the BASE aid for my one child in public school is 6.94 times more than I paid in taxes in 2022. If families have more than one child in public school, the disparity grows since mils are tied to homes, not children. Last year, when I had two children in public school, the disparity would have been 13.48 times more given to my children in BASE aid than I contributed to the General Fund. ((2 x \$4706)/\$698.28).

Who Has Access?

Every student is unique and deserves an "individualized education [which] provides an essential pathway to success" as this bill's preamble states. The question before us is, whether creating a system that leaves parents to haphazardly obtain educational services based on their ability to find local, reputable, affordable providers is really the best, most effective way to ensure that pathway? If a majority of parents find a gap in public education, wouldn't it be better to make sure the shortcoming is corrected so all Kansas children benefit?

I'll give you an example of why I believe the public way is better.

My 16 year old son is dyslexic. By the fourth grade, he read at the first-grade level, and the reading intervention program at the public school was not designed to remediate his learning delay. I asked the district for help. They agreed they didn't have the expertise or resources to helping dyslexic students so I sought private tutoring. Eventually, my son was able to read at grade level. Hooray. Now, some of you will say, "See! that is why we need this bill! Everyone should be able to pay for a private tutor, if that's what their child needs!" My reply to you is, "No, private tutoring is not the answer." What we were able to provide for our son was a privilege that many families cannot acquire, even with a voucher/ESA money. It took four years to remediate the reading delay through twice-weekly tutoring. I am a stay-at-home parent and had the time to drive across town regularly to get my son to and from tutoring. Also, finding a qualified tutor with time slots available was not easy - even in Kansas City. At the time, I wondered, "what do working families or families without local dyslexia tutors do?" Is it fair that only students whose families are able to locate and access private tutors get the help they need? Of course not. It was a terrible system. Full of inequity, inconvenience, unnecessary expense and frustration. The better solution was Kansas' Dyslexia Taskforce which brought Kansas educators and families together to improve reading education across the state. It made sure quality educational resources are available in the public schools so that ALL the dyslexic children can receive the reading instruction they need. Students today get a reading program that is based on reading science, and works much better for dyslexic students like my son. I know because I volunteer in a first grade classroom and see the difference in materials and teaching instruction. The Taskforce model is a much better, fairer model for addressing learning challenges schools still face.

How Do We Know It's Not Wasteful?

Let's say a family is unhappy with their public school and they take their BASE aid and spend it on a private program. Once the money is spent, there is little in the way of oversight to demonstrate the program or service succeeded. This bill only requires that "a portion" of the money be used to provide an education "in at least the subjects of reading, grammar, mathematics, social studies and science." That's pretty vague. There are no standards or measurements attached. This bill allows homeschool parents direct access to public fund without having to demonstrate to the state the educational soundness of their selected curriculum, that it is delivered with fidelity, or that their child achieved grade-appropriate skills in exchange for direct access to public funds. So we literally could be throwing away money when we allow families to spend ESA dollars without any oversight or accountability on programs that don't work as well as the ones used by public schools or at all. That's wasteful.

Ultimately, I wonder do we, as a state with a fiscally conservative bent, truly believe that this is the most fiscally responsible option? – to create a second, parallel, education system that has its own management costs, is less accountable and, has no meaningful way for taxpayers to know the educational outcomes of all students receiving these taxpayer funds?

Even with this voucher, geography, time, and cost could still put the services parents seek out of reach.

Recipients of education funds should be required to demonstrate the selected school, program or service results in appropriate educational outcomes.

Who are the Winners and Losers?

My final concern with this bill is that if, as a state, we chose to begin privatizing education, there certainly will be winners and losers.

The state loses. This bill could cost Kansas at least 128 million more in education dollars because private accredited schools will encourage all families to take advantage of this new, unfettered access to public funds, increasing the cost to the state through distributions of BASE aid for students who have not, in the past, received it.²

Small towns lose. According to data on the KSDE website, there are 125 accredited private schools. Most of them are centered in and around the three largest cities: Wichita, Topeka and Kansas City.³ Cities and counties with larger markets and more affluence will be winners and end up with a greater variety of options and price-points. As is currently the issue, smaller communities will find themselves with the least number of good options. A small student population will make small towns less attractive to new private schools which will face the same shortage of qualified staff that challenge our rural public schools.

Wealthy parents win. The more expensive private schools will likely continue to charge tuition greater than BASE aid and affluent families will be able to make up the difference. Poorer families have access to only what their voucher will buy.

The public loses. While accredited private schools do have to comply with some academic guidelines there is no requirement that they be transparent about how they spend the tuition money they receive. Further, these schools may engage in arbitrary and prejudicial discrimination which runs contrary to the intent of services funded with public money.

If this committee believes there are improvements that can be made to ensure more students receive an education that "considers [their] unique learning needs", then I hope you will find a better solution that works for all students and all Kansas communities. I urge you to vote no on this bill.

Do we believe tax funds should be used to create winners and losers?

² Based on all non-public school data I could find on the <u>KSDE website</u>, there are 26,446 students enrolled in accredited non-public schools. If each private school required all attending students to enroll in this program, the cost to the state (students x BASE aid of \$4846) would cost the state \$128,157,316. This would be new additional educational expenses to the state since private school students currently do not receive BASE aid. Of that, \$6,407,865.80 would be set aside for administrative costs. I could not fund any information on the KSDE website about the number of students currently homeschooled who would be eligible for this new program. But, there would be additional expenses to the state for homeschool students.



Chairman and members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to provide **opponent** testimony related to House Bill 2218.

In addition to being a concerned citizen of Kansas, I am a 13-year educator, a parent of students in USD 313, a grandparent of future students in multiple school districts across the state, a community member in McPherson, and I am a proud–vocal–supporter of public education in Kansas.

I don't know of anyone who would dispute that "every child in Kansas is unique with diverse learning needs" (lines 8-9, HB 2218). As both an educator and a parent of 6 children, I certainly would not. As a grandmother of children who are each very, very different, I know this will be true of them when they become students as well.

HB 2218 states, "The sunflower education equity act affirms that equity in education means that all children shall receive what they need educationally regardless of their socioeconomic, racial or cultural status. The act affirms and promotes that all children, without preference or bias, are uniquely capable and worthy of meeting and exceeding the highest caliber of expectations in an environment that best promotes their unique qualities, abilities, needs and goals" (lines 14-20, HB 2218). While this statement is true of the requirements of public schools in Kansas, it is inherently false when one starts talking about non-public schools. There is no oversight from the Department of Education or the state of Kansas to ensure the same requirements are met for students or educators in these settings as they must be in public schools, which are funded by tax dollars. There is no requirement for non-public schools to accept *ALL* students "regardless of their socioeconomic, racial or cultural status... without preference or bias." In fact, they regularly do not. There is no requirement for non-public schools to accept students who are not the best and brightest in their age group. Not the most popular among their peers. Not the best athlete, musician, artist. Not from a family with a good deal of disposable income. Not completely able-bodied. In fact, the number of students who are all of these things is an incredibly *TINY* fraction of all Kansas students. Non-public schools are not required to accept students with special needs or students of color or LGBTQ+ students.

Non-public schools are legally able to do the exact opposite of everything this bill proclaims it will provide for Kansas families because there is no oversight for non-public schools—*AND* it will divert public funds away from the public schools that, in fact, do.

As a registered Kansas voter, a Kansas educator, and a Kansas parent, I respectfully request that you **not** vote for a bill that will hurt Kansas children and the public schools that educate all of them "regardless of their socioeconomic, racial or cultural status."

Chair Williams and members of the committee:

Thank you for taking time to read my testimony in opposition of HB 2218. Careful consideration of all testimony is an important part of the legislative process. Unfortunately, I am not able to testify in person due to the short notice and scheduling conflicts.

I will start by stating that I am opposed to the use of public funds for private schools or for home schooling. Although we are fortunate to have some very good private schools in our area, there are not academic reasons that a student would need leave public school. I fully support a family's ability to choose private or homeschool options but public funds should not be used as a supplement. Public funds are intended to be used to provide programs of public good. For education, the Kansas Constitution defines this as providing public schools.

When considering HB 2218, other tax credits, vouchers, or education savings account legislation, the regulations and requirements that are placed on public schools should be included. HB 2567 set out the requirements for public schools allowing school choice for out of district students. These same policies should apply to any individual or organization that is granted public funds for private education. This would mean that any private school that accepts public funds, would accept all students in the order in which they apply without regard for the student's "ethnicity, national origin, gender, income level, disabling condition, proficiency in the English language, measure of achievement, aptitude or athletic ability." Additionally, no tuition should be charged. Furthermore, any agency that receives public funds should be accredited by KSDE and be held to the same level of regulation and accountability as a public school. Allowing the use of public funds for private use without comparable accountability would undermine the importance of education in our society.

We are fortunate in Kansas to have very good public schools. Although I understand the desire to support school choice, public funds should be reserved for public programs.

Again, thank you for considering my testimony in opposition of HB 2218.

Members of the House Committee on K-12 Education Budget:

I am a parent with students in Kansas schools and I deeply oppose the trojan horse that is "educational savings accounts" in Kansas.

HB 2218 is impressive in the length that it goes to behave like it's implementing a public good when it's doing the exact opposite. To put it frankly, this bill is hot garbage.

"Education Savings Accounts" are kind of like HSAs or "Health Savings Accounts," but they manage to be even worse. At least with a health savings account, we know that our government is denying us a basic public good in the form of universal healthcare and opts to, instead, provide us with a savings vehicle that doesn't work to meet the cost of healthcare.

"Education Savings Accounts" are worse. Instead of starting from a public good that we don't have, the ESA idea starts from a public good we do have, strips it down for spare parts, and then gives us scraps that we can use to "pay for an alternative." An alternative, I should add, that more than likely won't be fully defrayed by inflows to an ESA. All the while, the Universal Benefit of public education is kneecapped yet again.

If the goal is to shred what little public goods we have left in this state that families rely on, then the ESA is an obvious yes. But I think most folks like those public goods and would like to keep them, nay, would like to strengthen them in real ways that matter. Not siphon off taxpayer dollars to unregulated schools with no oversight as to what kinds of things are being taught. Our schools are not a strip mine for special interest groups, especially those built on the fever dream of privatizing everything.

I am opposed to HB 2218 for the following reason:

- This bill creates a dual education system in Kansas. The governing board for private schools would be appointed by politicians, whereas public schools are governed by an elected state school board and local school boards.
- This bill creates more bureaucracy in the Kansas school system.
- The bill is much too generous to those who donate for voucher scholarships. Why should donors get a bigger tax break than normal charity donations?
- Many private schools and homeschools use curricula materials that are weak in science or even deny the findings of science. (I have taught many college students who went to private schools and my daughter who has both homeschooled and taught in a private school, verified that this is true in her experience.)
- Students need to be exposed to broader ideas and experiences. By extending the program to high school students, a student may graduate without being exposed to those broader ideas or different cultures.
- The money could be much better spent. It could be used for currently underfunded special ed programs or early childhood programs. An NCLS speaker provided data that early childhood education returns four times as much money as is spent. The savings come in decreased remedial education, reduced incarceration, and higher incomes which results in better productivity and higher salaries which leads to more tax income for the state. It also probably leads to better citizenship.
- This would disadvantage many rural students who only have public schools available. This could cost Kansas up to \$20 million in tax income and take money that could be spent on rural public schools.
- There is no evidence that disadvantaged students get a better education at private schools. The claims that public schools are failing are based upon flawed methodology and are meaningless.
- If parents want to send their children to private schools or to homeschool them, they should pay the expenses. Currently, most of the children attending private schools are those of wealthy

parents. The scholarships would essentially help pay for educating children whose parents are wealthy and can afford it.

- This bill would encourage private schools to try to recruit the best students and athletes and they may avoid taking problem students or those with learning disabilities, which would greatly hurt public schools in the area. And, they would receive scholarship money to do this.
- Private schools are not held to the same standards for teacher preparation or curricula as public schools, so students attending them may be shortchanged.
- Originally created to help low income students receive a better education, this concept has now been expanded until it is now mostly a tax break for wealthy Kansans and corporations. Please vote "no" and show your support for Kansas' public schools.

Members of the House K-12 Education Budget Committee,

My name is Jeri Powers and I am the 2008 Kansas Teacher of the Year. I have been a public school educator for 25 years, and am a life-long Kansan, raising three sons in Kansas public schools. I am writing to express my opposition to HB 2218.

I realize with every complex issue there are emotionally opposing views, and many times it is extremely difficult to objectively wade through the details. When I hear terms such as *parent choice*, *money follows the child*, and *school choice*, it sounds enticing. However, I also know that every decision comes with unintended consequences. My concern is that we are not thinking through what these issues will most certainly be and how to best deal with them. This bill is flawed in many ways.

Specifically, my concerns center around these issues:

- 1. **Equity for All Students:** How will students with special needs receive the specialized services they need and deserve? These are our most vulnerable, and when students are spread around multiple physical sites, there are not enough teachers to provide support. Additionally, special education teachers "wrap around" each of their student's day, meaning they need to be in the same building, with the same children, throughout every day.
- 2. **Specialized Instruction:** I've spent the majority of my career working with students who have dyslexia. How will these students receive the specialized instruction they need and deserve? Many children with dyslexia do not require an IEP, rather their needs can be met in general education, with highly trained teachers and interventionists. Traveling from school-to-school wastes time and does not allow a teacher to build trusting relationships with her students.
- 3. **Accountability:** How will we monitor schools for quality? Who will oversee quality and from where will the funding come? How will we ensure that ALL schools follow the same rules? For example, public schools now must follow a rigorous process for accreditation. How will we make certain that all schools follow the same process? We all should have to play by the same rules if our goal is to monitor and evaluate academic outcomes.
- 4. **Fairness of Systems:** How will we handle schools that deny students admittance due to low academic performance, perceived cognitive ability or behavioral concerns? We can't legally discriminate; however, it happens frequently. Public schools must take all children. This is not the case with private.
- 5. **Funding:** We have a limited amount of money. The more we spread that over growing options, the less we have centralized for all learners. How will we ensure that all students have the services they need, when they need it, to reach their full potential?
- 6. **Protection of our Most Vulnerable Children:** How will this new system support our most vulnerable children, the ones who do not have active parents, looking out for their best interest? I believe a system must be judged on how well it cares for "the least of these."
- 7. **Bureaucracy:** As I read through this bill, I am shocked at the layers of bureaucracy that will be required to make this a system that advocates and protects all Kansas children. If we think there are too many layers of government involvement currently, this plan expands government control in order to ensure quality of services over a very broad range of options.

I urge you to please drop this bill and make certain it does not pass out of committee. We need to work together to improve our public schools, provide adequate funding for special education, and learn to work together in a more civil and understanding way. Please think through unintended consequences before voting.

Thank you for taking the time to read this brief testimony in opposition to HB 2218. I would like to share a real-time example I believe would immediately demonstrate how problematic this bill would be if made law.

Belle Plaine is a high poverty district. We receive state aid in both the Capital Outlay and the Supplemental General Fund. Our students demonstrate significant academic and behavioral needs. We are thankful for the resources the State has provided the last several years to ensure we are able to meet the needs of our students.

Two weeks ago we enrolled four students who had not attended public school for over two years. They were "home schooled". They moved from another county in Kansas. We assessed their academic progress and agreed with the grandparent to place each child one grade lower than where one would assume they would be placed based on their ages. Truthfully, we could have placed each child in a lower grade. Our task is to acclimate the children to school and then provide intervention so they can access learning. This is not the first example, just the latest. While this is not common, it is an issue rural schools can relate to and is not unique to Belle Plaine.

We will always provide the best education to every student who walks through our doors. HB 2218 will divert resources making it harder for schools to serve students and it will encourage future scenarios in which we will repair the damage of the unregulated non-public setting.

Last fall my family attended a high school football game on our team's journey to the state championship. My name is Karen Tritt and I am your 2010 Kansas Teacher of the Year. I've taught for 26 years in Kansas. I'm grateful for the opportunity to provide opposing testimony to HB 2218.

I express my deep opposition to this bill because it simply does not put students first.

- The bill does not provide equity for all citizens. As required by law, our public education system provides strategic support for EVERY student through interventions, accommodations, enrichment, and modifications. Private schools are not held to this same level of service. By virtue of their private status, these schools can accept or reject applicants based on what their school system can or wants to provide. Though HB 2218 is intended to provide choice, there is nothing here to ensure equity for families. If a child has an IEP or a 504 that requires substantial interventions, those families will most definitely not have the same choices as other families.
- The bill is **fiscally irresponsible**.
 - o HB 2218 moves funds from public schools into the private/religious sector. Even though funds would go into an Educational Savings Account (ESA), a good percentage of those same funds will then go to religious institutions. This will be a new precedent that connects church and state by a single adjoining link.
 - HB 2218 removes funds from public education even though public schools will still be required to meet the needs of all students. One might argue that fewer students translates to less expense for the districts. However, if the enrollment balance shifts (per bullet #1), that argument loses water.
 - Additionally, this bill will require another level of supervision at KSDE to oversee and protect the integrity of these ESAs. The opportunity for the abuse of funds is obvious and will need to be closely supervised. The shifting of funds away from public education will impact classrooms and services.

Please do not move this bill past the committee so that our great state of Kansas can continue to provide an excellent educational environment for all of our students. Public schools build equity. This bill does not.

Chairman and members of the committee, thank you for your consideration of this submitted **opponent testimony** related to House Bill 2218.

I am a lifelong and concerned citizen of Kansas, an educator of nine years, a parent of young children in USD 418, a community member in McPherson, and am a loyal proponent of public education in Kansas.

I don't know of anyone who would dispute that "every child in Kansas is unique with diverse learning needs" (lines 8-9, HB 2218). As both an educator and a parent, I certainly would not. HB 2218 states, "The sunflower education equity act affirms that equity in education means that all children shall receive what they need educationally regardless of their socioeconomic, racial or cultural status. The act affirms and promotes that all children, without preference or bias, are uniquely capable and worthy of meeting and exceeding the highest caliber of expectations in an environment that best promotes their unique qualities, abilities, needs and goals" (lines 14-20, HB 2218).

While this statement is true of the requirements of public schools in Kansas, it is inherently false when one starts talking about non-public schools. There is no oversight from the Department of Education or the state of Kansas to ensure the same requirements are met for students or educators in these settings as they must be in public schools, which are funded by tax dollars. There is no requirement for non-public schools to accept ALL students "regardless of their socioeconomic, racial or cultural status... without preference or bias." In fact, they regularly do not. There is no requirement for non-public schools to accept students who are not the best and brightest in their age group. Not the most popular among their peers. Not the best athlete, musician, artist. Not from a family with a good deal of disposable income. Not completely able-bodied. In fact, the number of students who are all of these things is an incredibly small fraction of all Kansas students. Non-public schools are not required to accept students with special needs or students of color or LGBTQ+ students.

Non-public schools are legally able to do the exact opposite of everything this bill proclaims it will provide for Kansas families because there is no oversight for non-public schools—AND it will divert public funds away from the public schools that, in fact, do.

Honorable Chair Williams and Committee Members,

The Kansas Association of Special Education Administrators (KASEA) is concerned about the effects of enacting legislation that would strip students who currently have protections under IDEA within public schools accredited by the State of Kansas. Therefore, KASEA opposes HB 2218.

Noted below are several specific concerns associated with this legislation.

- 1. **HB 2218** is a duplication of other statutes currently in place. Kansas already established the Tax Credit for Low Income Students Scholarship Program under K.S.A 72-4351 through 72-4357 nearly 10 years ago. Adding another voucher program to the Kansas education system may actually conflict with the current program and confuse the general public. In addition, it also creates a burden on taxpayers and state resources to implement dual programs.
- 2. Private schools are not required to be accredited through the Kansas Education Systems of Accreditation (KESA), which the Kansas State Board of Education has oversight. Private schools that are not accredited through KESA are not held to the same accountability standards as public schools. Non-accredited schools are not required to take state assessments or submit reports to KSDE such as student discipline and Emergency Safety Interventions. Non-accredited schools are also not required to screen for reading disorders as defined by the recent Kansas Board of Education's Dyslexia training and screening regulations.
- 2. **Private schools are not required to accept all students**, which really gives the "choice" to the private schools, versus the student. Private schools are not bound to the requirement of an Individualized Education Program (IEP) under IDEA and may or may not allow admission of a student with a disability based on the student's disability.



3. Private schools are not obligated to implement the requirements of IDEA and are not obligated to collaborate with the local school district to provide special education services. Private schools frequently do not choose to collaborate with their local school districts to ensure children with special needs receive services. Private schools are also not obligated to ensure implementation of IDEA's Child Find requirements which are outlined in both state and federal laws and regulations.

HB 2218 by its very name gives promise that it will create equity. If private schools can exclude students with disabilities, students with mental health issues, students who identify as LGBTQ+ or students who have parents who just happen to be of the same sex, then HB2218 is not a means to establishing equity. KASEA supports public education which ensures all students are provided opportunities to meet their unique learning and social-emotional needs. We urge our legislators to consider the complexity and inequities which would be created by opening yet another door to voucher programs in Kansas and vote no to HB 2218.

Mme. Chair, Ranking Member Winn, Members of the Committee:

Kansas Interfaith Action is a statewide, multi-faith issue-advocacy organization that "puts faith into action" by educating, engaging and advocating on behalf of people of faith and the public regarding critical racial, economic and climate justice issues. We are the advocacy partner of several of the mainline denominations in Kansas, including the ELCA Lutheran Church; the Kansas-Oklahoma Conference of the UCC; the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas; and the Mercy & Justice Team of the Great Plains Conference of the UMC, as well as of Jewish and Muslim individuals and faith communities. I submit testimony in opposition to HB2218.

Public education is a foundational element of our democratic system, helping to develop an educated and enlightened citizenry. The idea that every child, whatever their background or economic status, can get equal access to a world-class education, is one of the things that we can be proudest of as Americans. Public education is a project we all share, one of the few remaining areas of life where the entire society supports a project, whether they directly benefit from it or not.

Our public schools are the pride of Kansas; from the huge and world-class schools in Johnson County to the small school districts throughout our state, every child in Kansas has the right to a good education – and they get it. We should do nothing to undermine, or to underfund our system. We've been down that road before.

Vouchers undermine this commitment. Privatizing public education does not improve academic achievement. Private schools, religious schools, and homeschools, are not subject to the same accountability standards as public schools, and get to choose their students, unlike our public schools, which serve all students.

As I was preparing this testimony I went, as I always do, to the statements of our denominational partners. The position of by the United Methodist Church, both in its Statement Concerning Church-Government Relations and Education (1968) and the Statement on Church-Government Relations (2016 Book of Resolutions, #5012)¹ is so strong that they deserve extensive citation here:

The fundamental purpose of universal public education at the elementary and secondary levels is to provide equal and adequate educational opportunities for all children and young people, and thereby ensure the nation an enlightened citizenry.

We believe in the principle of universal public education, and we reaffirm our support of public educational institutions. At the same time, we recognize and pledge our continued allegiance to the US

constitutional principle that citizens have a right to establish and maintain private schools from private resources so long as such schools meet public standards of quality. Such schools have made a genuine contribution to society. We do not support the expansion or the strengthening of private schools with public funds. Furthermore, we oppose the establishment or strengthening of private schools that jeopardize the public school system or thwart valid public policy.

This bill is broader than the tuition tax credit expansion bill that we previously opposed. The schools that would benefit from this program could be unaccredited, could discriminate of the basis of race or religion, and are not subject to oversight by any government agency.

Bills like this are often called by their proponents "universal vouchers." This is ironic, because public education is already truly universal – open to all, without regard to race, religion, income or ability. Voucher programs are an attempt to get public money into private hands, without regard to how it impacts our students or our educational system.

Public education is a bulwark of our democratic system, bringing together young people from the broadest swath of life to learn both academic skills and how to live and work together. We have seen in the past in Kansas how systems that took years to build can be destroyed in a year or two of unwise legislation. Let's not let this happen to Kansas' public schools – truly the pride of our state.

I urge you to vote NO on HB2218.

Dear Chair Williams & Members of the Committee.

I write to voice opposition to HB 2218, creating a "Sunflower Education Equity Act" for expanding the Tax Credit Scholarship Program in Kansas.

School vouchers take public funds and are used to send some students to private schools. The effort to chip away at public schools, to erode the confidence communities have in our schools, to punish teachers and their collective support structures is more than 30 years old. This year we see all across the country and right here in Topeka, boilerplate language that has been shared around the anti-public education cohort, pushing vouchers into a whole new frontier.

Up 'til now, vouchers and like-programs were designated for specific student populations. Today we are hearing about these education savings accounts or ESA's. The idea is to grant money to each public school student < 18 and for their parents to spend as they see fit. That could be for traditional private schools, but also includes religious schools, online schools and approved costs for homeschooled children. Before now, ESA's have been open to limited populations (economically disadvantaged or special needs K-12) but HB2218 would make ESA's open to everyone, regardless of a family's ability to pay. The average cost to educate a child for a year is \$12,000.

It should be clear to everyone on this committee that school funding is more complicated than a per-pupil allocation. Public schools rely on tax dollars contributed to state general funds by all taxpayers and from the federal government. We distribute them in turn, theoretically at least, based on a district's enrollment and needs. But first and foremost, they are *obligated to educate all* students. When our middle son was in 5th grade, at a private day school in Kansas City, he was diagnosed with two different learning issues — each masking the effect of the other — resulting in struggles for him and confusion for his teachers as to why. They had no means to assist him, they told me. It was my public school district that helped me walk through the diagnosis and suggest an IEP for our son — one that could, in fact, be implemented at his expensive, prestigious school by his more than capable teachers. We wouldn't have made it through that year in that education setting, notwithstanding the high-priced private school we fronted on our own, had we not had the resources of our public school district to support our son. I was grateful our tax dollars had been well spent undergirding public education even if we weren't walking the hallways at that time.

HB2218 is an attack on the foundational idea of **public** education itself. The proponents want to use a public good for a private benefit. The drivers are private industry and their lobbyists eager to slurp from the money

sluice flushed from public coffers; the culture-wars are the battle tactic and tools deployed to win the war. This is not now nor has it ever been about the educational needs of students.

It is important to not lose sight of the contemporary context for legislation like HB2218. It goes hand in hand with Republican-led culture war arson: (1) Legislation banning critical race theory, (2) gender expression (3) demanding "curriculum transparency," and (4) "Parents' Bill of Rights" (legally giving parents power to review classroom instruction and/or to remove their child from lessons they object to). The aim is to keep public education embroiled in America's broader political wars.

Want proof? Look at Iowa lawmakers who last Tuesday held a hearing on identical legislation. A veteran teacher echoed many at the 2-hour hearing with his criticism that ESA's drain desperately needed resources away from public schools. Republican politicians argued the bill was the only way to ensure parents have power in their children's education — citing "political agendas being taught" but never providing any evidence.

Please think carefully about what mission you are actually on and the ensuing destruction of a vaunted education system that you are risking. It is not, it has never been, just about HB2218. This is a dangerous and completely unnecessary bill. Vote No on HB2218.

I am writing to voice my **opposition to bill HB2218**. I am a parent of two sons I chose to send to Catholic schools, and you may be surprised to be hearing from someone like me. So why am I writing in opposition?

- 1. My oldest son tested gifted in second grade. His Catholic school was not able to offer a gifted program at that time, so **if we wanted him to receive special programming for gifted students, the alternative was to send him to public school one half day a week**. I had a friend with a daughter the same age who had a learning disability. She was not able to enroll her daughter at the school because they were not in a position to serve her. The school has since bolstered its program; however, not all private schools are in a position to accommodate the needs of students like my son or my friend's daughter. Reducing public school funding is *not* the right answer.

I have two children who both attend private school. While one might assume having my children in private school would lead me to support the concept of a "Sunflower Education Savings Account", I actually fundamentally oppose this approach to school funding. My son was diagnosed with a learning disorder several years ago. The school was completely unprepared to support any alternate therapies or approaches. It was suggested I look at sending him for part of the day to public schools to get the assistance he needed. In fact, at his end of year parent teacher conference, the teacher seemed surprised at his diagnosis and argued with the extensive testing we had completed from trained professional. She was unwilling to support him in managing his diagnosis. This would never be allowed in a public-school setting as the state of Kansas oversees and requires support for their students. I am disappointed in the number of parents who hold the sentiment that they oppose vouchers because they want to keep kids with disabilities, special needs, or learning difficulties out of their schools.

For a number of reasons, we decided it was in his best interest to keep our son at the school he was in and seek resources outside the school and pay for it directly. His father is an ER physician and I serve as the CEO of a small business so we were able to afford this extra cost. It occurred to me as we navigated the system that we are fortunate to be able to provide resources to our son – but that the school completely failed him.

I am certain opening up vouchers in our state would be harmful to the public school system. For those families who cannot afford to seek services outside of school, those children will suffer as the schools are not looking for or responding to needs. The primary benefit to this approach is to further reduce the cost for the families who can already afford the choice to send their children to private schools.

It is our collective duty to protect and uphold the rights of our children to affordable, equitable, and excellent public education. These sentiments as well as the additional concerns I bring forward today are shared by Kansans from a range of political, ideological, and religious identities from across the state. Among them are:

HB 2218 creates further inequity in education. It diverts public dollars to fund private parochial schools. These schools are not held to the same standards, requirements, and accountability as Kansas public schools.

SB 2218 perpetuates discrimination. There are no requirements in place that would prevent a private school that receives public funding from subsequently rejecting students and families on the basis of religion, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, or disability.



SB 2218 does not seem to be based on empirical evidence. Since 2014, we are not aware of any data available, or required, to assess efficacy or warrant the use of public dollars to fund private and parochial institutions. There is no guarantee that participating students and families are, in fact, doing better than they were in their public school setting.

The future of our children is in your hands. If you seek to increase opportunities for education excellence, we urge you to reject HB 2218 Instead, champion data-driven efforts that are proven to increase positive socioeconomic outcomes—like fully funded public education and early childhood programs; and, increased access to healthcare, mental health, and disability services.

I am submitting written testimony (only) today to express my opposition to HB 2218, which is essentially a bill that diverts taxpayer dollars to private schools and homeschools resulting in decreased funding for public schools. I gather that the KS GOP gets annoyed when we call this a voucher bill, but that is exactly what this bill is. Calling it a scholarship does not take away from the fact that it uses taxpayer dollars to fund private schools.

There are many reasons for my objections: Homeschools and private schools are not subjected to the same level of accountability. Only public schools are required to accept and educate ALL students. Private schools are allowed to discriminate by not accepting students who have special needs, as well as students who are LGBTQ, students who are of a different religion (or who hold no religious views) and students who have some more extreme medical needs. Additionally, many private schools and homeschools do not participate in any sort of accountability, such as standardized tests, reporting attendance, or even following Kansas State Educational Standards. Our state does not even require yearly check-ins for homeschoolers & has no official count of the number of children being homeschooled at any given time. It's like the wild west when it comes to educating our children in these environments. As a former public school teacher, I find this lack of oversight to be extremely concerning.

My own children are both neurodivergent. My sophomore has autism and ADD as well as skeletal issues. All of these challenges are addressed in his IEP. My freshman has ADHD as well as OCD and anxiety. Both children are gifted and our public school has gone above and beyond to meet their needs in the most appropriate ways, regardless of the extra resources that are required. Public schools have worked very hard to find efficiencies since the legislature has created an environment of scarcity when it comes to finding over the past couple decades.

This bill would take public dollars & funnel it into vouchers for religious learning, which seems very un-American to me. I am not in favor of public money being spent to prop up religious institutions. The lack of accountability bothers me greatly.

The bill would also drain the pool of taxpayer dollars that are collected to be spent on PUBLIC education, which is an unacceptable outcome. The legislature has already spent decades in court trying to weasel out of their CONSTITUTIONAL DUTY to fund our schools. Unacceptable. HB 2218: Establishing the Sunflower education equity act to provide education savings accounts for qualified students in Kansas.

OPPONENT testimony (written only) February 2, 2023

Chair Williams and members of the committee:

I oppose this bill for many reasons and this testimony was easy to write. The objections to the failed school choice bill in 2022 still apply to this 2023 version. I find it extremely disappointing that a new education savings account bill now suddenly appears after the flawed 2022 bill was so roundly criticized and defeated.

HB 2218 is disturbingly short on details. There is only a mention of an audit process with zero details of the scope. The proposed oversight board is skewed to be heavily partisan and would also include members of the private school community as their own overseers. Without robust auditing, the program would be ripe for fraud.

There is no fiscal note for HB 2218. Without specific details concerning cost implementation and oversight, I will refer to last year's testimony provided by the Kansas treasurer. That testimony outlined estimated costs and additional labor needed to establish and maintain education savings accounts. It detailed how education savings account costs would be wasteful and excessive and the implementation timeline to be unrealistic. Exposing these facts in 2022 is perhaps why there is no detail in this year's version about how education savings accounts would function.

Simply HB 2218 would divert taxpayer funds from our public schools to private schools. Private schools do not have the same accountability as public schools. They are not bound to the same curriculum as public schools and in many cases include religious instruction that should not be subsidized by public funds.

Additionally, this is unfair to Kansas taxpayers and would create a two-tier education system that may benefit some students while hurting the majority of students. Private schools do not follow the same admission policies as public schools and have a choice to pick a small number of preferred students and deny most others. Students deemed unworthy by any measure (low test scores, physical or learning disabilities, etc.) would not be allowed a real choice. They would simply remain in a current system that would have less funding as a result of the funds diverted by this bill. Additionally, attending a private school simply isn't an option in many rural areas of the state. They do not exist.

I am a proud product of a private religious based education. My family sacrificed to make that possible. We would have never thought to ask for public tax payer funded assistance for it. We would have never wanted a state mandate that requires other taxpayers to pay for our tuition. This bill would actually undermine the mission of religious schools. Parochial schools have one function, which is to deliver instruction in a specific religious moral context and environment. This bill will ensure more students and families that do not share the same religious beliefs will be applying to and attending these private schools. Students that do not share the same religious beliefs become a disruption to the faith based instruction of those students that attend because of their deeply held family beliefs. This hurts the religious communities and families that have chosen to create a faith based environment through sacrifice and without state assistance.

I strongly reject the premise made by some on this committee that the Kansas public education system is failing kids. However, for committee members that assert the education system is a sinking ship I ask: Why is the proposed solution to only provide golden lifeboats to a chosen few instead of repairing and maintaining the ship for all the passengers? Private schools can only absorb a fraction of all students. They aren't available in many rural areas. Your job is to provide adequate budgeting for all kids and to not leave the vast majority behind to sink.

This bill is not about educational choice. This is about profits and personal gain. It moves public money into private hands without accountability. It essentially would provide a new tax break / subsidy to those already using private educational institutions. There is no widespread support for voucher-like programs and these programs were not what legislative candidates ran on in the 2022 campaign.

No matter the name - whether it's choice, vouchers, education savings accounts, or scholarships - it functions the same way. If it walks like a tax scheme, talks like a tax scheme, and it quacks like a tax scheme; then it's a tax scheme.

HB 2218 would damage public schools and the students and communities that currently rely on them. I strongly oppose this bill.

Dear Committee Members and Staff.

As a parent of four children participating in a nonaccredited private school, I have the following concerns about HB 2218:

- Parents running nonaccredited private schools have intentionally not accepted or wanted any government funds. With the receipt of government funds, it inherently gives the government a foothold into (a) determining how the education of a child participating in such a school should be performed and (b) determining how the funds should be spent with mandatory reporting and noncompliance penalties, including those that might oppose parents' sincerely held religious beliefs. Thus, this inherently inhibits the freedom of the parents to educate their children in a way they deem best, not as the state deems best.
- o I would rather keep the funds I would have otherwise paid into the state for my children's education to begin with. Under HB 2218, I might have received funds back from the state, but only after those funds have passed through the minefield of government inefficiency. Thus, the funds I am to receive through HB 2218 will not only consist of a small portion of my original tax dollars but also the tax dollars of several others, making this a fairly expensive program. In essence, I would rather put the money in my own savings account up front and spend it on my children's education instead of the state dictating a handout on the back end, which is not really savings at all.

Simply put, I neither need nor want <u>public</u> money to pay for <u>private</u> education, a dangerous concept that is already bankrupting colleges and universities. Those institutions have had significant, over-the-top tuition increases year over year as such government assistance has poured in, making degree-seeking institutions increasingly unaffordable. An unintended consequence could likely cause private school tuition within the state of Kansas to begin increasing similarly to the same effect government funding has had in the colleges and universities.

As an opponent of this bill in its current form, I ask that:

- 1. EITHER unaccredited private schools be specifically excluded from HB 2218
- 2. OR amending HB 2218 as follows, similar to that in West Virginia and Arizona:
 - a. Add "qualified schools as defined by the Sunflower Education Equity Act" as a fourth school option for parents under the compulsory school attendance law. That way, a parent can choose to send their child to public school, traditional private/religious/parochial, a combination of both, OR a qualified school—which might be a private/religious/parochial school that complies with all the regulations—under the ESA.
 - b. Add a definition of private school to the compulsory school attendance law that clarifies: "private school" includes competent, private instruction of a child directed by a parent or person acting as a parent. That way, parents' right to direct the education of their children is protected by statute.
 - c. Amend the definition of a qualified student in the Sunflower Education Equity Act to require attendance at a qualified school. The final definition of a qualified student would then say: "Qualified student" means a resident of Kansas who is eligible to enroll in a public elementary or secondary school in this state or in a preschool program for children with disabilities and who is enrolled in a qualified school."

Dear Chair and members of the committee,

I am writing to voice my opposition to bill HB2218. As a school psychologist, I am a leader for our student intervention teams in two elementary schools, oversee evaluations that identify students with exceptionalities for special services, provide consultation for academic and behavioral interventions, and explain and communicate data to educators in order to make good decisions regarding the instruction of our most valuable Kansas resource – our children. Make no mistake, the data is clear, school vouchers like the one proposed in HB2218, hurt children by diverting precious resources to private schools that do not have to accept students and do not adhere to the same oversight as our public schools.

Not even a year ago, this same body refused to properly fund special education services in our state. Make no mistake, Our most vulnerable students and the overworked, passionate educators that serve them have suffered. There is not enough resources to properly support our ever-diversifying student population. In order to make up the difference, funds from general education must be taken. Students cannot get transportation to their athletic functions and so many other services that help give them the quality education and school experience they deserve. The introduction of this bill diverting funds away after refusing to properly fund our public schools is an insult to every Kansas student and educator.

However, I am a professional that deals in objective data and facts. I invite you to read a research brief on school vouchers which was collected and summarized by the National Association of School Psychologists which I have included below:

Research on School Voucher Programs

Preliminary research on school voucher programs has demonstrated equivocal outcomes; some studies have tied student participation in voucher programs to improved academic achievement, whereas other reviews of existing research have suggested voucher programs have negligible impact or even negative impact on student academic achievement compared to public schools. Listed below are highlights from recent research and ongoing systematic reviews. However, additional research is needed to draw meaningful and definitive conclusions:

- Academic achievement growth for voucher students is similar to their public school counterparts, demonstrating no clear positive impact or gains for students using vouchers (Center on Educational Policy [CEP], 2011; National Bureau of Economic Research, 2015).
- Specific states have demonstrated conflicting student outcomes for those attending voucher schools:
- Students participating in Louisiana's school voucher program had substantially lower academic achievement (National Bureau of Economic Research, 2015)
- Washington D.C. students participating in their voucher program demonstrated small increases in reading achievement and high school graduation rates, but no evidence for improvements in math achievement (Wolf et al., 2013)
- While some studies may show graduation rates were higher for voucher students, many studies do not control for factors such as demographic differences (e.g., SES, race/ethnicity, parent educational attainment, employment status) between families who 2 use vouchers, which when controlled for, often result in negligible differences between students in public schools and those using vouchers in private schools (CEP, 2011)
- Student rates of satisfaction with their own schooling and other indicators of success including school climate were not significantly different between students using vouchers in private schools and their public school counterparts (Wolf et al., 2010)

How School Vouchers Could Impact Students With Disabilities

The Individuals With Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) grants critical rights and protections to students with disabilities to ensure that they have an equal opportunity to pursue a free and appropriate public education in the least restrictive environment. However, most states require students receiving vouchers to waive their rights to a free and appropriate public education (FAPE) provided by IDEA when they elect to attend a private school (Hensel, 2010; Cunningham, 2013; COPAA, 2016). Further, private school voucher programs raise the potential for lack of inclusion or lack of acceptance for students with disabilities. Private schools have the ability to select the students they want to serve and can refuse to educate a child if they deem their instructional program is not a fit for the student (NCSL, 2015); schools do not have to "accept" students who do not meet certain requirements. It is important to ensure parents are provided with sufficiently detailed information about the extent of special ed services available in order to provide FAPE in schools they are considering, so they can make a reasoned and informed choice. Listed below are a few state examples of how vouchers have been applied to students within special education:

- The Milwaukee Parental Choice Program, one of the oldest voucher programs in the country, does not require schools that receive voucher students to provide special education services. They can deny entry to students who are considered too severe to serve, and can choose to stop serving students at any time (Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, 2017).
- A recent survey on voucher and education savings account (ESA) programs conducted by the U.S. Government and Accountability Office (GAO) found that student eligibility for private schools is often based on student disability status or family income (GAO, 2016). Findings suggest that "the

Department's Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services will consider guidance about the responsibilities of SEAs and LEAs to ensure that IDEA's equitable services provisions are applied to students with disabilities enrolled by their parents in private schools under State voucher and ESA programs" (GAO, 2016).

• Some states offer special education vouchers, such as Florida's McKay Scholarship for Students with Disabilities. This allows IDEA-eligible students to receive a voucher for a sum of money that may or may not be equal to the state funded portion of the cost of their education in a public school. Families are then responsible for covering the remaining cost via supplement vouchers or other means (Almazan & Marshall, 2016; Winters & Greene, 2011), suggesting that only certain families may have the means, or elect to cover the difference for their child to attend a private school.

How Are Schools Held to Rigorous Accountability and Standards

It is important for schools to be accountable to families and the public regarding the quality of instruction and services provided to students. This safeguard applies to all public schools. The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) gives states the flexibility to effectively manage federal educational policies to meet the needs of their school communities. Under ESSA, public schools are held accountable for four indicators. For elementary schools those indicators include academic performance in English language arts (ELA) and math, English language learner (ELL) proficiency, another statewide academic indicator of choice, and one statewide nonacademic indicator of choice. For high schools, accountability indicators include ELA and math performance, ELL proficiency, graduation rates, and one statewide academic indicator of choice. These indicators allow state education stakeholders to customize their accountability systems in ways they have not been able to before. An accountability system can be based on a variety of indicators of student growth toward postsecondary college and/or career readiness. Chosen academic and non-academic accountability indicators need to contribute to identifying schools for ESSA supports and recognition, the timely reporting of information to education stakeholders, and establishing meaningful education goals and interim targets for the state and its school communities. ESSA accountability provisions apply to public schools; however not all private schools (including those that could receive voucher funds) are required to follow those same standards. It is important for voucher programs to be full participants within these accountability mandates. Any use of public monies to a non-public school entity (including vouchers) should also require participation in the state accountability system, allowing for meaningful comparison of student educational outcomes and to help ensure all students are making progress toward high standards.

References will be included below. It's clear that the research on beneficial outcomes of these voucher programs is murky at best, however, it is clear that vouchers are harmful and discriminatory toward our students with exceptionalities and take away resources from all of the estimated 90% of Kansas children who attend public schools. I am not willing to gamble with the well-being and education of Kansas students. All Kansas students. I urge the members of this committee to vote against this proposed bill and continue to invest in our most valuable resource, which has always been, and always will be our students. ALL students.



I am writing to voice my strong opposition to HB2218. Based on my experience as a parent of three students in Kansas public schools since 2010, as well as my 12 years of experience as a school board member, HB2218 will harm education in our state. I ask you to reject this proposal.


Our state constitution charges the legislature with creating a system of public schools and with providing adequate and equitable resources to those schools. HB2218 transfers public tax dollars away from the public school system to private schools that are not supervised by local boards of education; not subject to the oversight of the State Board of Education; not held to the same high levels of transparency and accountability for spending of taxpayer money; not held to the same high levels of accountability for student achievement; not required to serve all students who wish to attend; not required to provide due process to parents, students, or staff in resolving problems or concerns; and not accountable to any democratically elected governance body, parents, or voters. These shortcomings of HB2218 are especially egregious given that our public schools have been underfunded—both legally and as a matter of what it actually takes to provide the high-quality education Kansas parents expect and Kansas students deserve—since before my oldest son, now a senior in high school, started kindergarten. He has been shortchanged by the legislature, as have all the students and families in our public schools the last decade plus. Until the public schools these students attend are provided all the resources they need to thrive and excel, tax dollars should not be diverted to create a second, inequitable and inadequate system of education in our state.

Moreover, the body of research around education savings accounts and similar voucher programs is conclusive—they overwhelmingly result in transfers of tax dollars to wealthy families who are already sending their children to private school and, most alarmingly, they harm student achievement for those public-school students who attempt to use them.

The graphics below show that most voucher users never attended public school:



Shockingly, and alarmingly, for those students who moved from public to private school using a voucher, the negative academic impact on those students



approximates and even exceeds that seen as a result of the pandemic and Hurricane Katrina.

Moreover, studies of students who leave their voucher private school to return to public school have revealed that those returning students fare far better academically in their public school; data collected about students in Wisconsin showed "transferring students realize[d] substantial achievement gains after moving to the public sector."

Researchers in this field have further pointed out that the negative academic impacts of ESA/voucher programs substantially exceed the positive impacts of even highly successful academic programs such as high-quality pre-K.² This is compelling research-based evidence showing that ESA/voucher programs have harmful impacts to students. Kansas students and families cannot afford such a self-imposed academic disaster.

In closing, I ask you to vote NO on HB2218. The future of education in Kansas needs you to fully resource our public school system, not create separate and unequal systems that research shows ultimately harm student achievement.

I am Dr. Shane Kirchner from McPherson, KS and I am writing in opposition to HB2218, the Sunflower Education Equity Act. I am an educator in Kansas with nearly thirty years' experience. For the past 19 years I have been a professor of education at McPherson College and I am keenly aware of the teacher shortage. While this bill, on the surface, may help some families, I feel in the long term it will cause more damage to the profession and exasperate the teacher shortage.

I am concerned that the bill, as presented, contains little to no oversight of the private schools. While they are required to teach core subjects, they do not appear to have to teach the state standards. In short, other than a letter submitted to the board treasurer, there is not accountability of the private schools. Additionally, I'm concerned that private schools do not have to meet the needs of students with disabilities.

Ultimately, this bill will reduce the resources available to public schools by redirecting public money to private schools. Since private school don't have to accept students with disabilities, there will be a higher percentage of those students it public schools and, consequently an increased expenses by percentage of students in public schools. In short, the total amount available to public schools will be reduced. This is particularly concerning for our rural districts where private schools do not exist. In much of western Kansas, the public school is the only option. Several districts already operate on a 4-day school week as one way to reduce expenses. In short, this bill would remove money from the overall state coffers and ultimately reduce money to all public schools.

Teaching is a tough profession. We have a teacher shortage. We need to be doing everything we can to bolster our teachers and schools. I feel this bill, setting two different sets of standards for public and private schools and directing funding away from public schools, will ultimately increase the teacher shortage, not help it. For these reasons, I encourage you to oppose House Bill 2218: the Sunflower Education Equity Act.

My name is Samantha Neill and I am the 2018 Kansas Teacher of the Year and a 20-year teaching veteran; most importantly I am the mom of two school-aged boys who attend Buhler USD 313 and one college son who is considering a career as a public school teacher.

I am writing in opposition of HB2218 for several reasons.

There are currently 26 states who are introducing and debating these savings account/voucher style bills. This is not a bill that is brought forth by the majority of Kansans who expect us to fully-fund education. It is a nearly identical bill to many of the others across this country. The majority of Kansas counties depend on their public schools and have no other school options. Losing 8-10 kids in my district alone would result in the loss of 1 teaching position, increasing class sizes, and causing remaining state base aid to be split even further between children in our public schools. We've seen it too many times; when the public schools go, so goes the community.

Public schools are required to accept all children, regardless of their race, gender, identity, sexuality, religion, ethnicity, or ability. Private schools are not held to the same expectations as public schools and may turn students away for any of the reasons mentioned above. Many of our students in special education require more personnel and resources to be successful.

This bill exempts any of these non-public schools from having to share their curriculum, take measurement exams like state-assessments and ACTs, or have licensed teachers - all requirements that have been used to determine the effectiveness of public schools. I cannot fathom how leaders and adults who are pushing for more transparency from public schools can turn around in the same way and exempt non-public schools from these measures. Make it make sense because it seems like a double-standard.

This bill will serve those children who are lucky to have the resources and parents to choose their school opportunities. It does not put the needs of all students first; in fact, it will set up loopholes to divert funds from public school students' learning with little oversight or accountability. This bill allows for anyone who is approved to open a

homeschool or micro school and collect the base state aid. There is nothing stopping the "stripmall" schools from opening up as we have seen in other states.

Under this program, my oldest son, who was adopted out of foster care, would fall through the cracks. He wouldn't have had an advocate who fought for him like a parent can fight for him. Other children will fall through the cracks. They will be unaccounted for, in harm's way, with no other means to the outside world. This seems like a high price to pay for \$5,500. Without the support of his teachers, my son may have never made it out of his abusive homelife. Public schools provide so much to students in need - warmth, food, safety, and hope.

I have many other concerns, but these are the most important to my family. Instead of investing energy in this voucher-style program, we should be working together to create the strongest public schools that we can. In Kansas 65 counties have no other option but virtual school. The same proponents of us coming back to full, in-person learning during Covid-19 because of the "failure" of online and hybri school surely cannot support this.

I would ask you to please drop this bill from consideration. It should not pass out of committee.

- This bill impacts entire communities in a negative way by pulling monies from local school districts that are meant to serve ALL students within a district. When money is unavailable, schools are forced to cut programs, in many instances the programs that serve the most vulnerable in a community. In addition, communities that have a desire to grow MUST have a strong school system to attract businesses and new families.
- 2) The lack of oversight of both the distribution and use of money that is pulled from public education creates an opportunity for the misuse of the funds. It is possible, and I would contend probable, that some people who might receive a check meant to educate children, will use it for other means. <u>Stand Up Blue Valley: Families for Our Schools</u> is a parent and patron advocacy group in the Blue Valley School District. We advocate for legislation that supports Blue Valley Schools and work to help our community understand the importance of their votes to our schools.

Madam Chair and Committee members:

Stand Up Blue Valley: Families for Our Schools has reviewed HB 2218: Establishing the Sunflower education equity act to provide education savings accounts for qualified students in Kansas. We are submitting testimony **in opposition** to this bill.

As always: we support families' rights to send their children to private schools or to homeschool them. We DO NOT support giving tax money to non-public entities that don't serve all students and are not required to have state accreditation, public oversight, or any measure of accountability for the tax dollars received. Our general objection to tax money being used to fund private schools applies to any voucher, scholarship, or similar plan to divert public tax money away from public schools.

We will share specific concerns about HB 2218 that we noted when reviewing this bill:

Lack of public oversight of the program and the schools benefiting

HB 2218 provides for a Board that is state-wide (not answerable to local taxpayers), meets only twice a year, and is not elected by The People. Except for 2 of the 10 members, the Board is appointed. There is little oversight by direct taxpayer representatives. In contrast, Kansas public schools are overseen by a fully-elected Board of Education for each district. Blue Valley taxpayers elect a School Board that represents their interests in the direction of how public tax money is spent and how the community's children are educated.

HB 2218 provides for NO public oversight as to how the tax money is spent. What are the administration costs of the private schools benefiting from these tax dollars? Anti-public education entities complain about public school administrative costs (and we disagree with their contentions) but why would we support tax dollars handed to private schools with absolutely no oversight as to how those funds are spent once the school has the money? What are the students being taught by the private schools, home schools, or online vendors who are collecting our tax money? There is not oversight or accountability built in to ensure students are benefiting.

HB 2218 provides no requirements for state assessment tests or other standardized exams. There is no way to track whether the students participating in the program, individually or as a group, are keeping pace with grade level, if they are proficient, if they will be ready to graduate. This black hole in oversight of the wide variety of participating schools is completely unacceptable, considering tax dollars would be used to fund them.

HB 2218 does not require that homeschooled or non-traditionally-schooled students get the education they need. There is no oversight to ensure that students have the opportunity to master all core subjects. What if well-intentioned parents use ESA money to purchase courses in reading and social studies but run out of money for math?

Cost to taxpayers excessive and undefined

Implementation of this program would be costly, and the fiscal note for that cost is as of yet unknown. HB 2218 provides for a large bureaucracy including audits of contracts, fraud reporting service, development and maintenance of a website and mobile app, management of accounts and payments, development and updating of a handbook - in part.

The Kansas Treasurers' office will have numerous added responsibilities, and would certainly need to hire additional employees. Administration of applications and enrollment, oversight and suspension of accounts - Would the 5% per student withheld for these costs actually cover this work? There is no way to know.

ESA history of fraud in other states

There have been numerous recent examples of fraudulent use of ESA money across the country. "Arizona parents have made fraudulent purchases and misspent more than \$700,000 in public money allocated by the state's school-voucher style program, and state officials have recouped almost none of that money, a new Auditor General report has found."

State abdicating its responsibility to students

HB 2218 would pay non-qualified teachers and tutors in home and private schools. We object to the use of tax money to pay for an inferior education for Kansas students. It would pay for vendors of services that have not been evaluated for cost-effectiveness or even effectiveness in general. Taxpayer money will be the target of for-profit services; parents and unqualified private school administrators will not have the knowledge or tools to discern the good from the unhelpful, even harmful. HB 2218 contains no provisions to help prevent students from being used for the money assigned to them by unscrupulous services and private schools. The State has the responsibility to ensure that State dollars being spent to educate Kansas children are being spent in a fiscally responsible and effective manner.

Religious teachings may be covered

HB 2218 specifies: "The content or religious nature of a product or service may not be considered when determining whether payment for such product or service is an allowable expenditure from an account." Tax money then will be used to pay for religious materials and education.

Unequal/unfair financial treatment of benefitting private schools

HB 2218 states: "Unless an account has been closed pursuant to subsection (h), moneys remaining in an account at the end of a school year shall roll over in such account to the next succeeding school year." Kansas public schools are not permitted to roll over base state aid to the next school year. We object to home and private schools being given more latitude in management of finances in this way than public schools are.

Student support nonexistent

HB 2218 does not provide for any infrastructure to support students and families that is present in public schools. Our Blue Valley Schools have a school counselor in each building who guides students in course selection, college applications, to name just a few services. Students are assessed for learning disabilities and can get the support they need. Parents who only know their own kids may miss important delays that, if caught and supported in the public school, could be overcome or minimized by the time a student reaches graduation.

After careful consideration, we believe the answer to whether this program would actually benefit Kansas students and represent responsible stewardship of Kansas tax dollars is clearly "No." We ask that you vote NO on HB 2218.

Madam Chairwoman and members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit these comments *opposing HB 2218*. USD 229 Blue Valley has a strong history of working with this committee and our community, as we mutually seek to enhance student learning opportunities in our state. It is our hope that we continue growing these relationships, no matter the issues or challenges confronting K-12 education and the students we serve.

Blue Valley has a total student population of more than 22,000 and **consistently ranks in the top tier of high-performing schools, both in the state and the nation.** (See Quick Facts at the end of testimony.) Our patrons, our board, and our teachers are committed to providing educational opportunities that <u>don't just meet performance standards</u>, <u>but</u>, <u>rather</u>, <u>exceed performance expectations and prepare our students for success far beyond their years in our district</u>.

The Blue Valley Board of Education has a long-held policy position that states:

[Blue Valley] opposes public funding of private schools, including offering public tax credits that decrease state revenue, that do not comply with the same standards and requirements of public school districts, including governance by an elected local school board.

Major School Finance Reform

HB 2218 proposes a momentous shift in education finance, policy and accountability, by directly diverting public education funds into savings accounts dedicated to private and home-school education settings. Because the changes represent such a significant shift in the way the Kansas Constitution contemplates public education funding be channeled and supervised, we believe this legislation would be well-served by appointing an interim committee to further study and vet the various moving parts.

Accountability and Oversight

The Blue Valley Board of Education sets high academic and aspirational goals for all students entrusted to our district. Parents and businesses in our district expect academic excellence from our schools and our Board appropriates resources necessary to achieve that.

Our district strives to be good stewards of taxpayer dollars and supports a transparent budget process that allows parents and others to provide input toward ensuring funds are used to support excellence in student learning.

Blue Valley's budget is audited annually by an external accounting firm to ensure integrity and compliance with generally accepted accounting practices. Further, the district is annually audited by KSDE to ensure compliance with state and federal laws.

House K-12 Education Budget Committee Testimony on HB 2218, establishing the Sunflower Education Equity Act (written opposition)

Chair Williams and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide written testimony in opposition to HB 2218, which would create the Sunflower Education Equity Act, which would establish scholarship accounts for students pre-school age through post-secondary education.

Olathe Public Schools is the second largest school district in the state, with a student population of approximately 30,000 students. We are known for excellent student results, including high graduation rates and high ACT and SAT scores, consistently performing above state and national averages. We are a school district committed to narrowing achievement gaps and providing an excellent education to all students.

The Olathe Board of Education and staff are committed to providing programs and services that help students progress academically and emotionally. We have a long-standing tradition of working collaboratively with organizations and businesses in our community to create opportunities for students to excel. And, our district looks forward to continuing to work with the legislature to address challenges and enhance learning for all students.

The Olathe Board of Education has a long-standing policy position that states:

Schools receiving public funding should be required to meet state accreditation requirements, provide information about students and financing on the same basis as public schools, and accept all students on an equal, non-selective basis.

HB 2550 proposes substantive changes in education policy, finance, and accountability.

Academic accountability

Olathe Public Schools is continually adapting programs, creating new learning opportunities, and working with our business partners to provide students and parents with programs that challenge students academically. We recognize the learning experience needs to be highly individualized. That is why we remain focused on outcomes and providing our students with the high-quality learning opportunities that prepare them for success.

Our district continues to work with families to provide students the best possible learning experience. Student academic progress is monitored, assessed, and communicated to both

students and their families in various ways, including conferences and online reporting. We respect that parents may prefer alternative learning opportunities, whether it be homeschooling or enrolling their children in private schools, but we believe those programs should be held to the same rigorous academic and reporting standards as the school district.

The Olathe Board of Education has invested in evidence-based programs and services that support the youngest children in our community, and opportunities for our students preparing to leave the K-12 classroom setting. The district has a robust early childhood program that works with families to provide the best possible experiences for children ages birth to five years old. We provide, upon parent request and at no cost to the family, developmental screenings and provide services for children who demonstrate a significant delay in one or more areas of development. The district coordinates with other organizations when appropriate and necessary to provide additional support.

At the other end of the learning spectrum, our district works with post-secondary institutions to provide opportunities for students to earn college credit(s) before graduating from high school. We also work collaboratively with businesses to create apprenticeships and work-study programs that provide alternative learning environments and better prepare some students for entry into the workforce.

Fiscal accountability

The Olathe Board of Education strives to be a good steward of taxpayer dollars. We are not only required, but support, a transparent budget process that allows parents and community members to have input and ask questions about how resources are used to support student learning. The district holds budget workshops and board meetings that invite public participation. An external accounting firm annually audits our budget to ensure we follow generally accepted accounting principles. That budget is also subject to an audit by the Kansas State Department of Education to ensure that expenditures comply with state and federal laws. And, at the discretion of the legislature, our district is audited by the Division of Legislative Post Audit – often to ensure that we are in compliance with state laws, and that we are achieving the outcomes intended by the legislature. All this information and additional budget resources are publicly available for patrons.

HB 2218 does not appear to impose these same requirements or establish similar expectations for nonpublic entities, whether private schools or other nonpublic learning environments. There are few financial requirements other than submitting receipts for educational expenditures (broadly defined). Unlike school districts, there is no requirement that private entities meet a minimum standard of submitting or publishing a budget plan for how public dollars will be utilized to achieve outcomes for students – something that has been an essential part of our conversations related to K-12 education funding and policy discussions with policymakers. The funds being directed to nonpublic entities are taxpayer dollars, and we believe they should be held to the same level of accountability as our district.

The Olathe Board of Education appreciates the legislature's investment and interest in working with us to ensure that each child has the opportunity to learn. We know we are making a difference in our students' lives and remain committed to working with you to address the needs of all students. Madam Chair, Members of the Committee:

Kansas City, Kansas Public Schools (KCKPS/USD 500) is the largest school district in Wyandotte County and the fifth largest school district in the state of Kansas with just over 22,000 students enrolled. We are determined to empower every one of our students to reach their full potential: academically, socially, and emotionally. With this focus, we can ensure that by 2031, all our students will graduate with a Diploma+ endorsement prepared for college and careers.

We oppose HB 2218 because we believe it will dilute public education opportunities in Wyandotte County. KCKPS believes that the State of Kansas should strive to provide a constitutionally adequate and equitable educational opportunity for ALL Kansas students.

HB 2218 became available in written form on January 30, 2023, and USD 500, as well as many other districts, have struggled to understand the details included in this newly proposed educational funding model. In our initial review, we identified a number of areas of concern. We are not at this point prepared to say this is an exhaustive list and promise to continue to evaluate it. Hopefully, we will be given the opportunity to provide future comments.

Before addressing our concerns, we want to express our unequivocal and fundamental belief that every parent or guardian should continue to have the right to send their child to the best educational opportunity they desire. KCKPS and other Kansas public schools are responsible for providing that opportunity for all children. Therefore, public resources should go to public schools.

These are some of the more specific concerns we have with this bill:


- HB 2218 sets up a separate organizational board to administer this program. Article VI 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution says *The legislature shall provide for a state board of education which shall have general supervision of public schools, educational institutions, and all the educational interests of the state.* This proposed bill appears to conflict with Article VI.
- HB 2218 provides for a transfer of funds from the state general fund to the students' parents, or
 guardians for use in a non-accredited educational setting. The language appears to be open to any
 student in the public or private setting. It also appears to provide state resources for services
 currently not available in public schools. The size and scope of this program could ultimately
 destroy our public education system, which is the only system in our state that serves all students.

Nothing in this bill ensures that the state appropriation will pay for the actual cost of the non-accredited educational setting. There is no protection for the student or family against additional costs that may be required by the non-public educational setting they are interested in attending. ESA funds provided to students and families often would not cover tuition costs alone. For many families, an ESA and a tax credit scholarship would be necessary to meet the overall cost of the non-accredited educational setting.

USD 500 is greatly concerned with the increasing education "reform" rhetoric and disingenuous culture wars surrounding public schools. The needless debate around Education Savings Accounts and education tax credit scholarship programs are tactics that seek to divert critical public school funding to the private sector.

Despite claims that school voucher programs lead to corresponding gains in student success, no credible research has suggested that vouchers improve academic performance. If anything, some programs have been found to have a negative impact on student achievement. Non-accredited school settings are not required to provide performance data.

We respectfully ask that you reject HB 2218 and direct future efforts to fully fund the Kansas public school system.
