SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for SB 102 by Senate Committee on Education

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning SB 102 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

SB 102 would require students enrolling in a technical college to be domiciliary residents of the State of Kansas for at least six months prior to enrollment for any term or session to be considered residents for fee purposes. All other persons would be considered nonresidents of the State of Kansas for fee purposes with the following exceptions:

- 1. Employees of a technical college;
- 2. Persons having special domestic relations circumstances;
- 3. Persons who have lost their resident status within six months of enrollment;
- 4. Active duty military servicemembers;
- 5. Domiciliary residents of the state who were in active military service prior to becoming domiciliary residents upon meeting certain residence duration requirements;
- 6. Persons who are not domiciliary residents of the state but have graduated from a high school accredited by the State Board of Education within six months of enrollment and meet certain other requirements; and
- 7. Persons who are domiciliary residents of the state whose residence was established upon recruitment by an employer and meet certain other requirements.

The bill would include language to require the Kansas Board of Regents to distribute State General Fund appropriations for postsecondary non-tiered course credit hours to community The Honorable Molly Baumgardner, Chairperson Page 2—SB 102

colleges and technical colleges for students who are Kansas residents; to determine amounts distributed; and to establish the rates to be used as the state's share as required under current law.

The Kansas Board of Regents indicates the enactment of SB 102 would reduce the annual amount of state aid currently distributed to technical colleges; however, a fiscal effect cannot be estimate as it is unknown how many students would move from resident to non-resident status. Any fiscal effect associated with SB 102 is not reflected in *The FY 2024 Governor's Budget Report*.
