AN ACT concerning {counties; requiring the secretary for aging and 1 2 disability services to reimburse counties for certain costs when a person is<u>confined</u> in a county jail awaiting examination, evaluation 3 or treatment for competency; relating to} county jails; removing the 4 5 requirement that every county shall have a jail; modernizing 6 requirements related to food, drink and medical care for prisoners and 7 jail records; modifying procedures used when district courts commit 8 prisoners to jail in another county and when counties contract with city jails or other county jails to keep prisoners; requiring a medical 9 examination before certain United States prisoners or city prisoners are 10 taken into custody of a county jail; amending K.S.A. 19-1901, 19-1903, 11 19-1904, 19-1905, 19-1910, 19-1911, 19-1916, 19-1917, 19-1927, 19-12 13 1929 and 19-1930 and repealing the existing sections; also repealing K.S.A. 19-1906, 19-1907, 19-1908, 19-1912, 19-1913, 19-1914 and 19-14 1915. 15

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17 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

18 *New Section 1.* (a) Whenever a person is in the custody of <u>a sheriff</u> and confined in a county jail awaiting examination, evaluation or 19 treatment pursuant to K.S.A. 22-3219, 22-3302, 22-3303, 22-3428, 22-20 3429 or 22-3430, and amendments thereto, the county that maintains 21 22 such county jail shall be reimbursed by the secretary for aging and 23 disability services for the costs related to such custody at the rate of \$100 24 per day. The county shall be compensated at such rate for each day that a person is in custody and confined as described in this subsection: 25

(1) If such person is awaiting examination or evaluation, from the
date the request for examination or evaluation is made until the date the
person is taken from confinement in the county jail for such
examination or evaluation or the examination or evaluation is
completed at the county jail; and

31 (2) if such person is awaiting treatment, from the date of return to 32 confinement in the county jail from examination or evaluation or the examination or evaluation is completed at the county jail until the date
 the person is taken from confinement in the county jail for such
 treatment or treatment is completed at the county jail.

(b) On and after July 1, 2022, if a county has a claim for 4 reimbursement of costs described in subsection (a), the county shall 5 6 notify and provide documentation of such costs to the secretary for 7 aging and disability services on a quarterly basis. The secretary for aging and disability services shall certify the amount of moneys 8 attributable to such costs and shall transmit a copy of such certification 9 to the director of accounts and reports. Upon receipt of such 10 certification, the director of accounts and reports shall transfer an 11 12 amount of moneys equal to such certified amount from the state general fund to the county competency expense fund. The secretary for aging 13 and disability services shall transmit a copy of each such certification to 14 15 the director of legislative research and the director of the budget.

16 (c) The secretary for aging and disability services shall develop and 17 implement a procedure to provide payments to counites pursuant to 18 subsection (b) on a quarterly basis.

(d) If there are no moneys available in the county competency
expense fund to pay any such reimbursements, the county may file a
claim against the state pursuant to article 9 of chapter 46 of the Kansas
Statutes Annotated, and amendments thereto.

23 (e) There is hereby established in the state treasury the county 24 competency expense fund that shall be administered by the secretary for 25 aging and disability services. All expenditures from the county competency expense fund shall be for the purpose of reimbursing 26 counties for the costs described in subsection (a). All expenditures from 27 28 such fund shall be made in accordance with appropriation acts upon 29 warrants of the director of accounts and reports issued pursuant to vouchers approved by the secretary for aging and disability services or 30 31 the secretary's designee.}

32 (f) For the purposes of this section, "county jail" means a jail 33 operated by a county or a consolidated law enforcement agency.

Section 1: {Sec. 2.} K.S.A. 19-1901 is hereby amended to read as
follows: 19-1901. There shall be established and kept at Every county-seat,
by authority of the board of county commissioners shall provide jail
services, at the expense of the county, a jail for the safekeeping of

9 Sec. 3. {4.} K.S.A. 19-1904 is hereby amended to read as follows: 19-10 1904. The sheriff of each county-must shall keep a true and exact calendar of all prisoners committed to the county jail, which. Such calendar-must 11 shall contain the names of all persons who are committed, their place of 12 13 abode, the time of their commitment, the time of their discharge, the cause of their commitment, the authority that committed them, and the 14 15 description of their persons; and. When any person is liberated released 16 from the county jail, such calendar-must shall state the time when and the 17 authority by which such liberation took place; and authority for such 18 release and the time when such release occurred. If any person-escape 19 escapes from the county jail, it must such calendar shall state particularly 20 the time and manner of such escape.

21 Sec.-4. {5.} K.S.A. 19-1905 is hereby amended to read as follows: 19-22 1905. At the opening of each term of the district-or criminal court-within 23 his in the sheriff's county, the sheriff-must return a copy of such calendar, 24 under his hand shall provide a record of the calendar maintained pursuant 25 to K.S.A. 19-1904, and amendments thereto, to the judge of such court-26 and if any sheriff neglect or refuse so to do, he shall be punished by fine 27 not exceeding five hundred dollars by providing a physical or electronic 28 copy of such calendar or access to an electronic record of such calendar. Sec. 5. {6.} K.S.A. 19-1910 is hereby amended to read as follows: 19-1910. (a) When a prisoner is committed to a county jail in a criminal action, the board of county commissioners shall allow the sheriff reasonable charges *funding* for maintaining such prisoner.

35 (b) (1) If a person is stopped by or is in the custody of a law 36 enforcement officer, as defined in K.S.A. 22-2202, and amendments 37 thereto, who is an employee of the state and such person is injured by the 38 officer while acting within the scope of such officer's authority, costs 39 incurred for medical care and treatment of the person shall be paid by the 40 state if such care and treatment is required due to the injury and a determination has been made that the person has no other resources. When 41 such medical expenses have been paid by the state, the state may seek 42 43 reimbursement of such expenses from the prisoner. If the state determines

1 that the prisoner is covered under a current individual or group accident 2 and health insurance policy, medical service plan contract, hospital service 3 corporation contract, hospital and medical service corporation contract, 4 fraternal benefit society or health maintenance organization contract, then 5 the state may require the prisoner or the provider rendering health eare 6 healthcare services to the prisoner to submit a claim for such-health care 7 healthcare services rendered in accordance with the prisoner's policy or 8 contract

9 (2) All other costs incurred by the county for medical care and 10 treatment of prisoners held within the county shall be paid from the county general fund when a determination has been made that the prisoner has no 11 12 other resources. When medical expenses have been paid out of the county 13 general fund of any county in this state for a prisoner held within such 14 county, the county may seek reimbursement of such expenses from the 15 prisoner. If the county determines that a prisoner of the county jail is 16 covered under a current individual or group accident and health insurance 17 policy, medical service plan contract, hospital service corporation contract, 18 hospital and medical service corporation contract, fraternal benefit society 19 or health maintenance organization contract, then the county may require 20 the prisoner of such county jail or the provider rendering health care 21 services to the prisoner to submit a claim for such health care services 22 rendered in accordance with the prisoner's policy or contract.

(c) When a prisoner is delivered to a county jail pursuant to K.S.A.
75-5217, and amendments thereto, the costs of holding such prisoner shall
be paid as provided in K.S.A. 19-1930, and amendments thereto.

Sec. -6: {7.} K.S.A. 19-1911 is hereby amended to read as follows: 19-1911. (a) When a prisoner is confined by virtue of any process directed to the sheriff; and which shall require such process is required to be returned to the issuing court whence it issued, such sheriff shall keep a copy of the same, together with his return made thereon, which such process and return. Such copy, duly certified by such sheriff, shall be presumptive evidence of his such sheriff's right to retain such prisoner in custody.

(b) All instruments of every kind, or attested copies thereof, by which
a prisoner is committed to or released from the custody of the sheriff, shall
be regularly endorsed and filed and safely kept in a paper or electronic
form by such sheriff, or such sheriff's deputy acting as the keeper of the
jail.

(c) The records required to be retained in this section shall be
 delivered to the successor of the officers having charge of the prisoner.

40 Sec. 7: {8.} K.S.A. 19-1916 is hereby amended to read as follows: 19-41 1916. Any committing judge of the district court of any county-in which 42 *where* there is no sufficient jail may order any person whom they may 43 lawfully order to be committed to prison to be sent to the jail of the-county 1 nearest having a sufficient jail; and nearest county that has sufficient space

2 and means to care for the inmate as determined by the sheriff or keeper of 3 the jail of such nearest county. The sheriff of such nearest county shall, on 4 exhibit of the order of such judge, which order shall have endorsed thereon 5 that contains a statement that there is no sufficient jail in-the such judge's 6 county from whence it issued, receive and keep in custody in the jail of his 7 or her such sheriff's county the prisoner ordered to be committed-as-8 aforesaid, at the expense of the county from which such person was sent; and the said sheriff shall, upon the order of the committing judge of the 9 district court, redeliver such person when demanded. Sec. 8: **{9.}** K.S.A. 19-1917 is hereby amended to read as follows: 19-1917. Any county jail may be used for the safekeeping of any fugitive from justice from another state or territory, and. The *jailer sheriff or the keeper of the jail of such county* shall-in such ease be entitled to reasonable compensation for the support and custody of such fugitive from justice, to be paid by the officer demanding the custody of the same *such fugitive*.

19 Sec. -9. {10.} K.S.A. 19-1927 is hereby amended to read as follows: 20 19-1927. Whenever any county or board of county commissioners in this 21 state owns a tract of real estate formerly the site for its county jail, and the 22 same such real estate is no longer used for that purpose, and a new county 23 jail has been built elsewhere in such county, and such abandoned jail and its site is no longer in the judgment of the board of county commissioners 24 25 of such county needed for county jail purposes, the board of county commissioners of such county, without a vote of the people or of the 26 27 electors of such county, may:

(a) Sell and dispose of such real estate either at public or private sale,
for cash or other consideration and on such terms as the board of county
commissioners of such county deems to be *in* the best interests of the
county, or;

43 Sec. 10. {11.} K.S.A. 19-1929 is hereby amended to read as follows:

19-1929. (a) Any county in the state, which that is without a sufficient jail
 by reason of the remodeling of its jail or the construction of a new jail or
 for any other reason, may contract with:

4 (1) Any city in-such county the state having an adequate jail for the 5 use of the such jail of such city upon such terms as the board of county 6 commissioners and the governing body of such city may agree; or

7 (2) any county in the state having an adequate jail for the use of such 8 jail upon such terms as the board of county commissioners and the 9 receiving county's board of county commissioners may agree.

(b) Any committing judge of the district court of any such county 10 may order any person whom they may lawfully order to be committed to 11 12 prison; to be committed to such other county or city jail, and the officer having charge of such keeper of the jail shall receive and keep in custody 13 therein any prisoner ordered to be committed as aforesaid, and shall upon 14 15 the order of the committing court redeliver such person when demanded. 16 The sheriff of the county ordering commitment is responsible for 17 transportation of the prisoner.

18 Sec.-11. {12.} K.S.A. 19-1930 is hereby amended to read as follows: 19 19-1930. (a) (1) The sheriff or the keeper of the jail in any county of the 20 state shall receive all prisoners committed to the sheriff's or jailer's custody 21 by the authority of the United States or by the authority of any city located 22 in such county and shall keep them safely in the same manner as prisoners 23 of the county until discharged in accordance with law. The county 24 maintaining such prisoners shall receive from the United States or such 25 city compensation for the maintenance of such prisoners in an amount equal to that provided by the county for maintenance of county prisoners 26 27 and provision shall be made for the maintenance of such prisoners in the 28 same manner as prisoners of the county. The governing body of any city committing prisoners to the county jail shall provide for the payment of 29 30 such compensation upon receipt of a statement from the sheriff of such 31 county as to the amount due therefor from such city.

32 (2) The sheriff and the keeper of the jail shall not be required to 33 receive or detain a prisoner-in custody under paragraph (1) who is in the 34 custody of an arresting agency until the prisoner has been examined by a 35 medical care facility as defined in K.S.A. 65-425, and amendments thereto, 36 or a healthcare provider as defined in K.S.A. 40-3401, and amendments 37 thereto, if the prisoner appears to be:

- 43 (3) Except as provided in K.S.A. 22-4612 and 22-4613, and _

1 amendments thereto, the prisoner shall remain in the custody of the

2 arresting agency during the examination required under paragraph (2):

3 and the cost of the examination and resulting treatment under paragraph:

4 (2) is the financial responsibility of the prisoner receiving the examination
 5 or treatment. Except as provided in K.S.A. 22-4613, and amendments
 6 thereto, the prisoner shall remain in the custody of the arresting
 7 agency during the examination required under paragraph (2).

8 (4) The cost of the examination and resulting treatment under 9 paragraph (2) is the financial responsibility of the prisoner receiving 10 the examination or treatment in accordance with K.S.A. 19-4444 and 11 22-4612, and amendments thereto.

12 (b) The sheriff or the keeper of the jail in any county of the state shall 13 receive all prisoners committed to the sheriff's or jailer's custody pursuant to K.S.A. 75-5217, and amendments thereto, and shall keep them safely in 14 15 the same manner as prisoners of the county until discharged in accordance 16 with law or until otherwise ordered by the secretary of corrections. The 17 cost of maintenance of such prisoners, including medical costs of such 18 prisoners shall be paid by the department of corrections in an amount 19 equal to that provided by the county for maintenance of county prisoners.

20 (c) In lieu of charging city authorities for the cost of maintenance of 21 prisoners as provided by subsections (a) and (b), the board of county 22 commissioners of Sedgwick county may levy a tax not to exceed one mill 23 upon all tangible taxable property of the county to pay such costs and the 24 costs of maintaining county prisoners. No revenue derived from such levy 25 shall be used to pay the costs of maintenance of prisoners committed to the iail by federal or state authorities, or authorities of other counties or cities 26 27 in other counties. For the purpose of this subsection, if any portion of a 28 city is located within a county levving a tax hereunder, all prisoners of 29 such city shall be deemed prisoners of such county.

30 (d) The board of county commissioners of a county may provide by 31 resolution that any inmate of the county jail who participates in a work release or job training program for which the inmate receives 32 33 compensation or a subsistence allowance shall be required to pay to the 34 county an amount not exceeding \$20 per day to defray costs of 35 maintaining such inmate in the county jail. Such resolution shall provide 36 for reduction or waiver of such amount in instances in which payment 37 would create undue hardship for an inmate. The inmate shall pay any 38 amount charged pursuant to such resolution, in cash or by money order, to 39 the county treasurer, who shall deposit the entire amount in the county 40 treasury and credit it to the county general fund. If payment is made in 41 cash, the county treasurer shall provide the inmate with a written receipt 42 for such payment. If the county is otherwise entitled to receive reimbursement or compensation for the maintenance of an inmate who is 43

required to pay an amount pursuant to such resolution, the amount paid by
 such inmate shall be deducted from the amount of the other reimbursement
 or compensation to which the county is entitled.

4 (e) (1) The board of county commissioners of a county may provide 5 by resolution that any inmate of the county jail who is incarcerated in the 6 county jail pursuant to a sentence for the conviction of a crime in this state 7 shall be required to pay to the county a fee in an amount not exceeding the 8 county's daily cost of housing the inmate to defray the costs of maintaining 9 such inmate in the county jail for each day prior to and after conviction for 10 an offense resulting in a conviction.

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(2) Such resolution shall provide:

12 (A) For the priority of restitution, child support, court costs or fines13 over such fee;

(B) for reduction or waiver of such amount in instances in which
 payment would create undue hardship for an inmate and for a procedure to
 provide for a reduction or waiver; and

(C) that if the inmate fails to pay such amount charged pursuant to
such resolution, the county keeping such inmate may garnish such inmate's
commissary account to recover such costs, upon notice and hearing given
to such inmate as provided for in any such resolution contemplated herein.

(3) The inmate shall pay the amount charged pursuant to such resolution, in cash or by money order, or by release of funds in the inmate's jail commissary account, to the county treasurer, who shall deposit the entire amount in the county treasury and credit it to the county general fund.

(4) The sheriff shall forward any garnished commissary account
payment to the county treasurer, who shall deposit the entire amount in the
county treasury and credit it to the county general fund.

(5) If the county is otherwise entitled to receive reimbursement or compensation for the maintenance of an inmate who is required to pay an amount pursuant to such resolution, and such reimbursement or compensation constitutes the entirety of the costs of maintaining such inmate in the county jail, the amount paid by such inmate shall be deducted from the amount of the other reimbursement or compensation to which the county is entitled.

(f) If any sheriff or <u>jailer</u> keeper of the jail neglects or refuses to
perform the services and duties required by the provisions of this act, the
sheriff or <u>jailer</u> keeper of the jail shall be subject to the same penalties,
forfeitures and actions as if the prisoners had been committed under the
authority of this state.

41 (g) Attorneys of prisoners held in a county jail shall be permitted to 42 visit them professionally at all reasonable hours.

43 (h) As used in this section:

"Arresting agency" does not include a surety, bail agent or 1 (1)bail enforcement agent who arrests a person who was released on an 2 3 appearance bond pursuant to K.S.A. 22-2809, and amendments 4 thereto.

5 "Serious injury" means any injury with a substantial risk of death (2) 6 or resulting in:

7 (A) Loss of orientation, loss of full movement of a limb or complaint 8 of neck or spinal pain with an onset related to the incident leading to or 9 during the person's custody;

(B) a reasonable belief a bone fracture may exist;

(C) laceration with an appearance it needs sutures;

12 (D) loss or serious impairment of vision with an onset during or 13 subsequent to the events leading to the arrest;

14 loss or fracture of any teeth with an onset during or subsequent to (E)15 the events leading to the arrest; or

16 (F) any similar condition reasonably indicating immediate 17 assessment by a medical care provider is prudent.

(2)(3) "Serious illness" includes, but is not limited to:

(A) Any illness or ailment resulting in loss of consciousness or 19 20 responsiveness or affecting a person's level of consciousness to a degree 21 *immediate intervention is prudent;*

(B) a body temperature in excess of 101° F:

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(C) acute or chronic blood loss indicative of underlying illness: or

24 (D) pain to a degree it affects the person's ability to function.

25 (3)(4) "Seriously impaired by alcohol or drugs or combination thereof" means the loss of consciousness, inability to stand without 26 27 assistance or inability to move from one location to another without 28 assistance reasonably believed to be induced by the consumption of 29 alcohol, a controlled substance as defined in chapter 65 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, and amendments thereto, a drug other than a 30 31 controlled substance or a combination of alcohol, controlled substances or 32 drugs.
