SUPPLEMENTAL NOTE ON HOUSE BILL NO. 2324

As Amended by House Committee on Corrections and Juvenile Justice

Brief*

HB 2324 would create new crimes concerning minors and electronic cigarettes, which the bill would define. Specifically, it would be unlawful to sell, furnish, or distribute electronic cigarettes to any person under 18 years of age and, with some exceptions, to sell electronic cigarettes by means of a vending machine in any establishment open to minors or a self-service display in any establishment. It also would require a retail dealer to add electronic cigarettes to the sign explaining cigarettes and tobacco products cannot be sold to minors. Further, it would be unlawful for any person who is under 18 to purchase, attempt to purchase, possess, or attempt to possess electronic cigarettes.

Background

In the House Committee on Corrections and Juvenile Justice, representatives of the American Cancer Society and the Tobacco Free Kansas Coalition and the Leavenworth County Attorney offered testimony in support of HB 2324. No opponents offered testimony. The Committee amended the definition of "electronic cigarette" to clarify it does not have to be shaped like or similar to a cigarette.

The fiscal note for HB 2324, as introduced, indicates passage would have no fiscal effect on the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, and additional staff

time required for inspection of licensed cigarette retail dealers could be absorbed within the Department of Revenue's existing resources.
