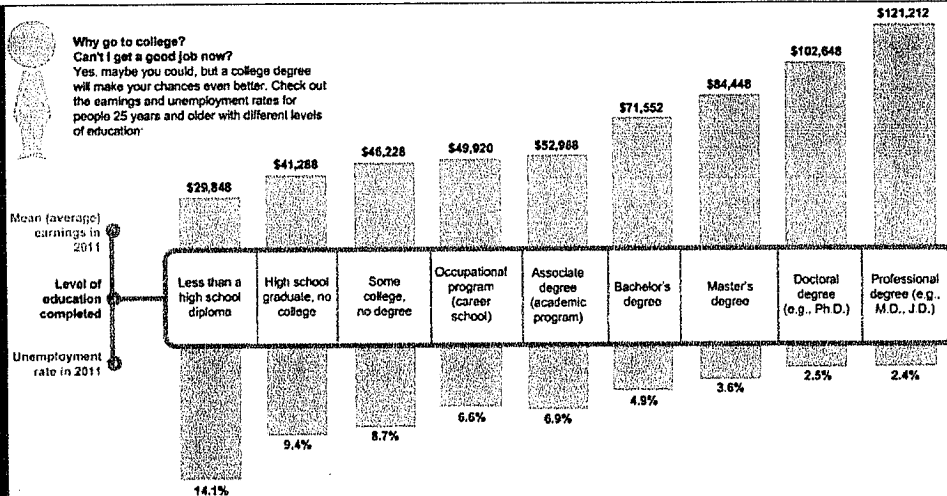

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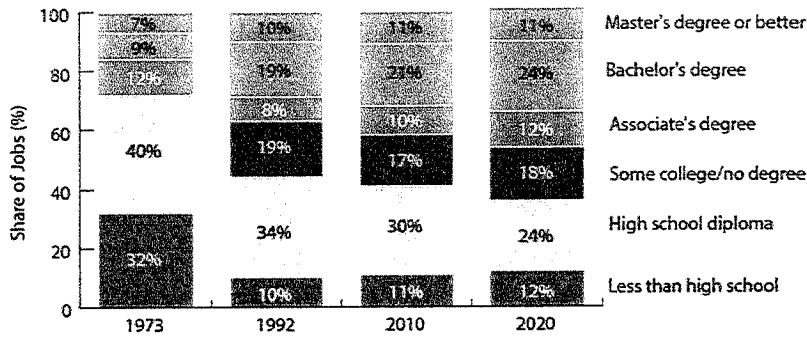

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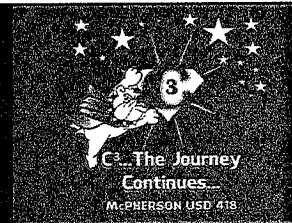
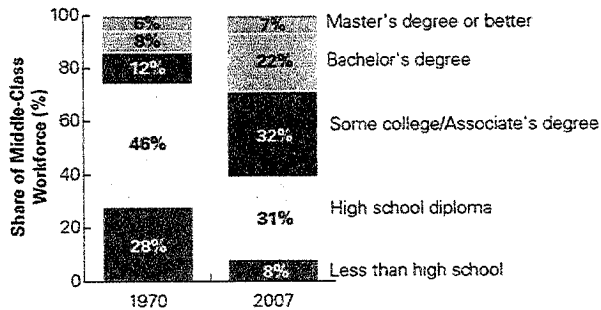


Figure 1. High school-educated workers represent a decreasing share of the middle class.

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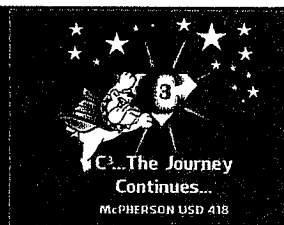
By 2018, **64%** of jobs in Kansas will require postsecondary education.

This is **1** percentage point above the national average of **63%**.

Kansas ranks **13th** in postsecondary education intensity for 2018.

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Kansas needs 64% of workers to have a postsecondary certificate or degree.

Approximately 40% need to be bachelor degrees or higher

Approximately 24% need to have a certificate or associate degree

Current status in Kansas is...

Only 46% of all Kansas students graduating high school will go on to any type of postsecondary completion (a what-if projection)

Only 24% of those who do go on to postsecondary education will complete a certificate or degree

Only 10% will complete a bachelor's degree

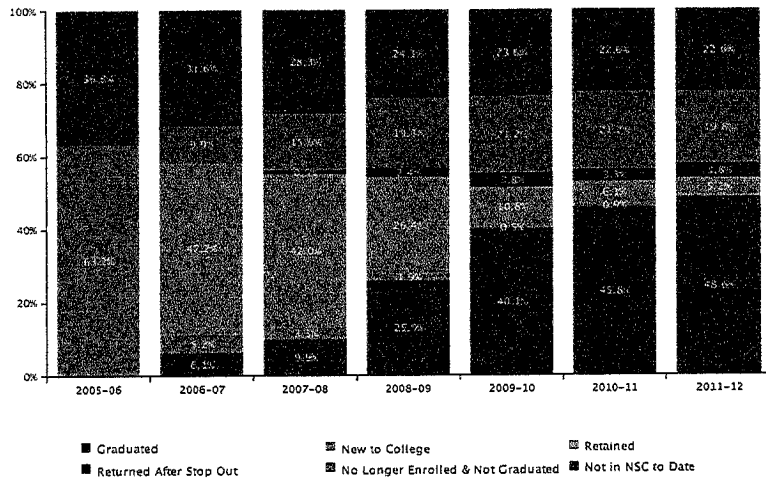
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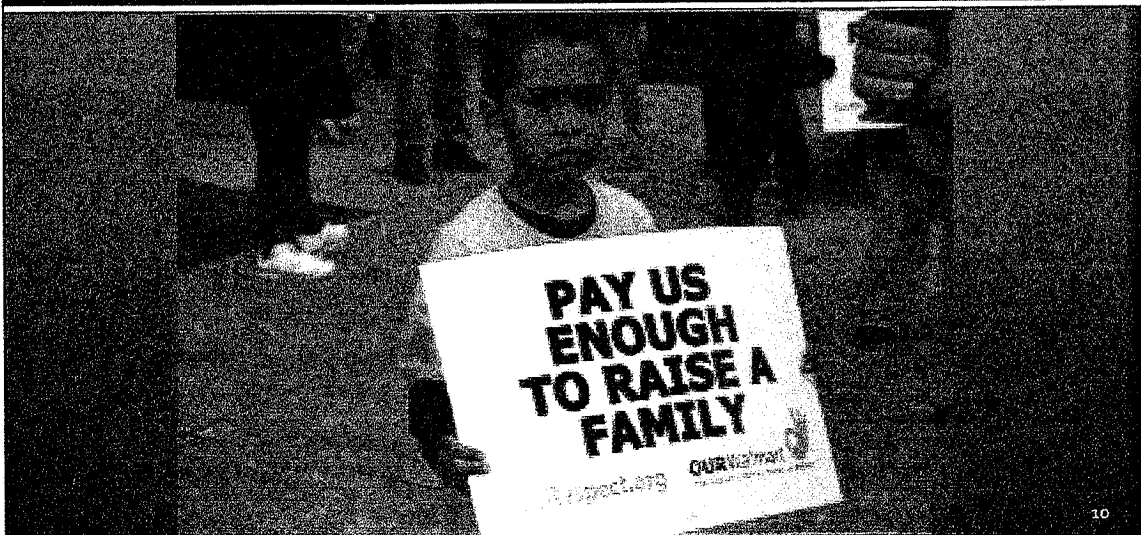


Class of 2005 Postsecondary Enrollment and Progress



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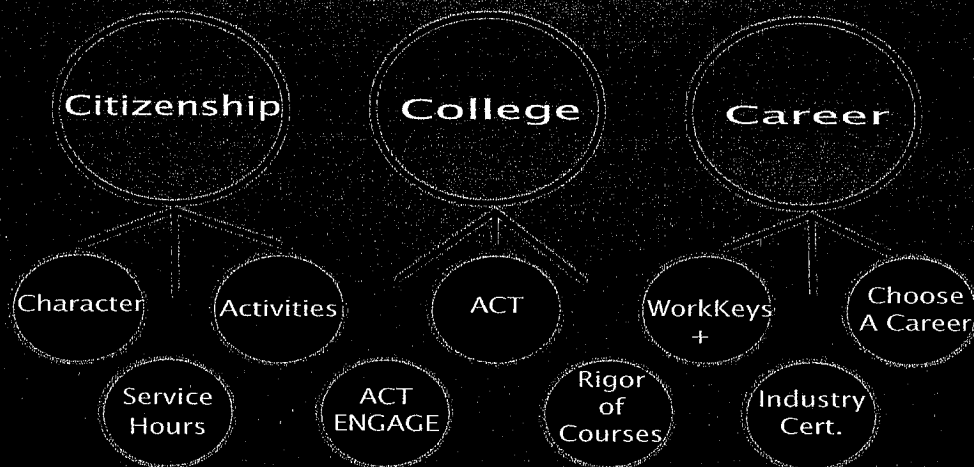
