AN ACT concerning schools; relating to pupils and reading proficiency; 1 2 enacting the Kansas reads to succeed act. 3 4 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas: 5 Section 1. Sections 1 through 5, and amendments thereto, shall be 6 known and may be cited as the Kansas reads to succeed act. 7 Sec. 2. As used in the Kansas reads to succeed act: 8 (a) "Alternative standardized reading assessment" means an 9 assessment to identify reading comprehension for grade<u>three</u> {one}; 10 (b) "qualifying organization" means a nonprofit organization <u>or</u>{,}a 11 nonprofit organization in collaboration with a school district *{or a school* 12 district}: "nonprofit organization" means those nonprofit organizations 13 (c)14 exempt from federal income tax pursuant to section 501(c) of the internal revenue code of 1986, as in effect on the effective date of this act: 15 (d) "reading state assessment" means the assessment adopted by the 16 17 state board used to identify the reading comprehension for grade-three-18 {one}: 19 "school district" or "district" means any unified school district (e) 20 organized and operating under the laws of this state whose percentage of 21 pupils scoring at the lowest achievement standard on the most recent 22 reading state assessment is more than the average percentage of pupils 23 scoring at the lowest achievement standard on the most recent reading 24 state assessment for all unified school districts: 25 (f) "school year" shall have the meaning ascribed thereto in K.S.A. 26 72-6408, and amendments thereto; and 27 (g) "state board" means the state board of education. 28 Sec. 3. (a) For school year 2016-2017 and each school year thereafter, 29 the board of education of each school district shall adopt a policy prohibiting the promotion of a pupil from grade three to grade four {one to 30 grade two? if such pupil scores at the lowest achievement standard on the 31 32 most recent reading state assessment or an alternative standardized reading assessment. Such policy shall include a procedure to administer a second 33 alternative standardized reading assessment approved by the board of 34 35 education of the school district to any pupil who scores at the lowest achievement standard on the most recent reading state assessment or 36

alternative standardized reading assessment prior to such pupil being
 retained in grade<u>three</u> *{one}*. Such policy may include, but is limited to,
 the following exceptions to mandatory retention if the school district
 provides such pupil with supplemental instruction until such pupil has
 achieved the appropriate reading skills for the pupil's grade level:

6 (1) A pupil who is enrolled in a program of bilingual education and 7 who has obtained less than two years of instruction in that school district;

8 (2) a pupil who is an exceptional child receiving special education 9 services and whose individualized education plan indicates participation 10 by the pupil in the statewide assessment program is not appropriate;

(3) a pupil who was previously retained in grade<u>three</u> *{one}* for one
 or more years and who has received intervention services for two or more
 years;<u>or</u>

(4) a pupil whose parent has requested a meeting with the appropriate
school district personnel to review the decision to retain such pupil and
whose parent after such review determines that it is in the best interests of
the pupil to be promoted to grade<u>four</u>. *[two; or*

(5) a pupil who has demonstrated through a teacher-developed
 portfolio that such pupil has achieved the appropriate reading skills for
 the pupil's grade level.

(6) a pupil is recommended to be promoted by a teacher and such
 recommendation is approved by both the principal and the
 superintendent in accordance with subsection (f).}

(b) The board of education of each school district may adopt in its
policy under subsection (a) the opportunity to promote a pupil to grade
four {two} if such pupil has been retained in grade-three {one} and, after
being retained for one semester, identified as meets standards or higher, as
demonstrated on the most recent reading state assessment or an alternative
standardized reading assessment.

30 (c) The board of education shall provide for the following as part of31 the policy adopted pursuant to this section:

(1) Schools shall be required to provide early screening or testing of
 pupils enrolled in pre-kindergarten, kindergarten and grades one and two
 to identify those pupils with reading deficiencies.

(2) Pupils identified pursuant to paragraph (1) shall be provided
intervention services based on the best practices for education of pupils
with such deficiencies.

(3) Intervention services provided to pupils who have been retained
in grade<u>three</u> *{one}* in accordance with the policy adopted pursuant to this
section shall be more intensive than those intervention services previously
provided to such pupil.

42 (4) Schools shall be required to notify the parent of any pupil 43 identified pursuant to paragraph (1) that such pupil has reading

- deficiencies, any intervention services that will be provided by the school
 and the list of qualifying organizations published by the Kansas children's
 cabinet pursuant to section 4, and amendments thereto.
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(d) A school district shall file annually a report with the state board of education containing the following information:

6 (1) The number of pupils who were retained in grade<u>three</u> *{one}* in 7 the most recent school year; and

8 (2) the number of pupils who were granted exemptions from 9 mandatory retention under subsection (a) in the most recent school year.

(e) The state board is authorized to adopt rules and regulations as to
what is an acceptable alternative standardized reading assessment and the
type of scores which a pupil must receive in order to be identified as meets
standards on such alternative standardized reading assessment for grade
three {one}.

15 (f) If the parent of the pupil fails to request a meeting under-16 subsection (a)(4) within 15 days of receiving written notification that the 17 pupil is being retained in grade three, a teacher may submit documentation and recommend to the principal that such pupil be promoted from grade 18 19 three to grade four. Upon receipt of such recommendation, the principal-20 shall review such documentation and determine whether the pupil shall be 21 promoted and provide such recommendation to the superintendent for-22 approval.

23 {(f) If the parent of the pupil fails to request a meeting under 24 subsection (a)(4) within 15 days of receiving written notification that the 25 pupil is being retained in grade one, a teacher may submit documentation and recommend to the principal that such pupil be 26 27 promoted from grade one to grade two. Upon receipt of such recommendation, the principal shall review such documentation and 28 29 determine whether the pupil shall be promoted and provide such 30 recommendation to the superintendent for approval.}

(f) {(g)} This section shall take effect on and after July 1, 2016.

32 Sec. 4. (a) The Kansas children's cabinet shall establish the Kansas 33 reads to succeed program.

34 (b) (1) A qualifying organization may apply to the Kansas children's 35 cabinet for a grant of state moneys from the Kansas reads to succeed 36 program for the purpose of: (A) Developing research-based interventions 37 and strategies designed to assist pupils with acquiring reading skills for 38 kindergarten and grades one through three {grade one} and to prevent 39 pupils from being retained in grade-three {one}; (B) providing training and education on such interventions and strategies to teachers in rural 40 41 communities; and (C) providing after school programs, summer school programs and parent education programs implementing such interventions 42 43 and strategies. The Kansas children's cabinet shall award such grants of 1 state moneys in accordance with the provisions of this section.

2 (2) To be eligible to receive a grant of state moneys from the Kansas 3 reads to succeed program, a qualifying organization shall submit to the 4 Kansas children's cabinet an application for a grant. The application shall 5 be prepared in such form and manner as the Kansas children's cabinet shall 6 require and shall be submitted at a time to be determined and specified by 7 the Kansas children's cabinet. All grants shall be awarded by the Kansas 8 children's cabinet in accordance with the standards and criteria established 9 by the Kansas children's cabinet, with preference given to those qualifying 10 organizations who provide at least a 30% match of funds which are not 11 state or federal moneys.

(3) Each qualifying organization which is awarded a grant shall
 submit any periodic and special reports of statistical, financial and such
 other information as the Kansas children's cabinet may request.

15 (c) Each fiscal year, to the extent there are sufficient moneys 16 appropriated to the Kansas reads to succeed program, the Kansas children's 17 cabinet shall determine the amount of grants to be awarded to each 18 qualifying organization. If such qualifying organization includes a school 19 district, upon receipt of a grant of state moneys from the Kansas reads to 20 succeed program, the amount of such grant may be deposited in the 21 general fund of a school district. Moneys deposited in the general fund of a 22 school district under this subsection shall be considered reimbursements 23 for the purpose of the school district finance and quality performance act.

24 (d) The Kansas children's cabinet, with the assistance of the state 25 board, shall prepare a longitudinal analysis report of pupil assessment data. 26 Such report shall track those pupils who received services from qualifying 27 organizations which have been awarded state moneys from the Kansas 28 reads to succeed program under this section. Prior to the regular session of the legislature of each year, the Kansas children's cabinet shall submit the 29 30 longitudinal analysis report of pupil assessment data to the committee on 31 education of the house of representatives, the committee on education of the senate, the committee on appropriations of the house of 32 33 representatives, the committee on ways and means of the senate and the 34 governor.

(e) The Kansas children's cabinet shall annually publish a list of all
qualifying organizations receiving grant funds under this section, including
the contact information of such organizations. Such list shall be made
available to each school district and to the public.

(f) The Kansas children's cabinet may adopt such rules and
 regulations necessary to implement and carry out the provisions of this
 section.

42 Sec. 5. (a) There is hereby established the Kansas reads to succeed 43 task force. The task force shall be composed of seven members, as HB 2140—Am. by SCW

1 follows:

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(1) Three members appointed by the governor;

3 (2) one member appointed by the chairperson of the committee on 4 education of the house of representatives;

5 (3) one member appointed by the chairperson of the committee on 6 education of the senate;

7 (4) one member appointed by the ranking minority member of the 8 committee on education of the house of representatives; and

9 (5) one member appointed by the ranking minority member of the 10 committee on education of the senate.

(b) Members shall be appointed on or before July 1, 2013. Membersappointed shall have experience:

13 (1) Teaching pupils enrolled in pre-kindergarten, kindergarten or
 14 grades one, two or three {grade one};

(2) working as a reading specialist; or

16 (3) working as a teacher or specialist with pupils who receive at-risk 17 services.

(c) Any vacancy in the membership of the task force shall be filled by
 appointment in the same manner prescribed by this section for original
 appointment.

21 (d) The first meeting of the task force shall be called by the 22 commissioner of education on or before August 1, 2013. The members of 23 the task force shall select a chairperson and vice-chairperson from the membership of the task force. The task force may meet at any time and at 24 any place within the state on the call of the chairperson. A quorum of the 25 task force shall be four members. All actions of the task force shall be by 26 motion adopted by a majority of those members present when there is a 27 28 quorum.

(e) Upon request of the task force, the state board of education shall
 provide consultants and assistance, and shall provide any information and
 supporting documentation requested by the task force.

(f) If approved by the legislative coordinating council, members of
the task force attending regular or special meetings or subcommittee
meetings authorized by the task force, shall be paid amounts for expenses,
mileage and subsistence as provided in subsection (e) of K.S.A. 75-3223,
and amendments thereto.

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(g) The Kansas reads to succeed task force shall:

(1) Study and make recommendations on the implementation of
interventions and strategies designed to assist pupils enrolled in
kindergarten and<u>grades one through three</u> {grade one} with acquiring
reading skills;

42 (2) conduct hearings, receive information and consider 43 recommendations on implementation of such interventions and strategies

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from teachers, specialists, parents, the department of education, the state
 board of education and any other interested parties; and

3 (3) prepare and submit a report on the work of the task force to the 4 committee on education of the house of representatives and the committee 5 on education of the senate on or before January 13, 2014.

6 (h) The task force shall cease to exist and the provisions of this 7 section shall expire on June 30, 2014.

8 Sec. 6. (a) The Kansas children's cabinet shall establish the Kansas 9 reads to succeed incentive program.

(b) Each school year, to the extent there are sufficient moneys 10 appropriated to the Kansas reads to succeed incentive program, the Kansas 11 children's cabinet shall make a monetary award to those school districts 12 who have at least one elementary school identified by the commissioner of 13 14 education as a top 100 public elementary school under subsection (c). 15 Such school districts shall receive an award in an amount equal to \$10,000 16 for each such elementary school. Such awards shall be paid at such times 17 as established by the Kansas children's cabinet. Upon receipt of such award, in accordance with this section, the amount of the award shall be 18 19 deposited in the general fund of a school district. Moneys deposited in the 20 general fund of a school district under this subsection shall be considered 21 reimbursements for the purpose of the school district finance and quality 22 performance act.

(c) Commencing in school year 2013-2014 and each school year
 thereafter, the commissioner of education shall identify the top 100 public
 elementary schools within the state of Kansas which demonstrate
 improvement in grade<u>four {*two*</u>} student reading proficiency.

(d) The Kansas children's cabinet and the state board *{of education}*,
jointly, may adopt such rules and regulations necessary to implement and
carry out the provisions of this section.

30 Sec. 7. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its 31 publication in the statute book.

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
