

#### UnitedHealthcare Dual Special Needs Patient Story

I am a Care Manager at a local Physician clinic. Part of my job is to survey the needs of patients and assist them in ways to improve their current health and situation.

Some of the situations I encounter with our patients bring both smiles as well as tears, but all of them bring me to a greater level of gratitude. One such story is the story of an unlikely duo that paired up to help each other through the toughest of times.

Mrs. C is 75 years old and can barely walk and has debilitating heart failure. Her neighbor across the hall is Mr S, a 45-year-old man with Diabetes that is blind, and suffered several other problems due to his diabetes. These neighbors struck up a friendship that has helped both cope with the difficulties of life. Since Mr. S was an only child, and his parents had both died, Mrs. C became an adopted family member to him.

This team is able to help each other with groceries by combining their funds. Mr. S pushes Mrs. C in her wheelchair by Mrs. C's directions to the bus stop outside their building. They use coupons that Mrs. C clips to save money. When I learned of the plight of these two, I asked Mrs. C if they had any help services, in which they did not. I quickly arranged every service I felt they could qualify for, then suggested that she apply for DSNP for both, and assisted them with obtaining forms they could fill out and mail.

Mrs. C was quite amazed at the opportunities that the DSNP plan would provide them with. When I spoke with her last, she was very happy and thanked me several times for caring enough to help seek out ways to help their situation.

I could share several other stories about how the DSNP has helped other patients, but for the sake of time, will stop here. I truly feel that the DSNP program helps the most vulnerable and under privileged patients secure the basic needs for survival and self-management. As we continue to see trends in populations of chronic needs patients, this program will give a life line to many that do not currently feel they have one.
