I support Senate Bill 331 that seeks to amend K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 32-837.

Kansas has many natural wonders that offer not only opportunities for income through tourism and travelers, but also a chance for the local population of Kansans to stay active, health and enjoy the outdoors with their family. As a newer father, I enjoy taking my 16 month old Ava on bike rides as well as hikes at home as well as on vacations in Colorado and elsewhere.
