Substitute for HOUSE BILL No. 2545

AN ACT concerning gaming; relating to the Kansas expanded lottery act;
 relating to the state debtor setoff program; relating to horse and
 greyhound racing; creating the Kansas horse council fund; amending
 K.S.A. 74-8836 and K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 74-8702, 74-8741, 74-8743,
 74-8744, 74-8746, 74-8747, 74-8766, 74-8814 and 75-6204 and
 repealing the existing sections.

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8 WHEREAS, In light of the historic support for the availability of horse 9 and dog racing in the state of Kansas, the long history and heritage of the 10 greyhound and horse industry in the state and the support for the 11 availability of electronic gaming machines at race facilities, this act is 12 aimed at resurrecting these well-known and existing facilities; and

WHEREAS, Allowing horse and dog racetracks to be economically
 viable will improve the Kansas economy, promote tourism and protect the
 state's reputation in the greyhound and horse industry, which has existed in
 Kansas long before the advent of casinos and electronic gaming; and

WHEREAS, There are positive economic and agribusiness benefits derived from revitalizing our existing racetracks, which have been idle since the passage of 2007 Senate Bill No. 66 due to the inability to make a sustainable profit, including farms and breeding operations; and

WHEREAS, It has been more than 10 years since the vote to approve
and place electronic gaming machines at Wichita Greyhound Park in
Sedgwick County; and

WHEREAS, An economic study has estimated that passage of this act and the resulting capital investments in the racetracks will result in a significant number of new jobs and a significant increase in state and local tax revenue without the need for economic development incentives; and

WHEREAS, That economic study has also estimated that the passage of this act will channel millions of dollars annually to farmers and ranchers, who have been struggling in the current farm and ranch economy, and will benefit greyhound and horse breeders and the support services employed by these breeders; and

WHEREAS, The existence of current lottery gaming facility
 management contracts is hereby acknowledged, and it is the intent of the
 legislature to protect the state from financial exposure in the event lottery
 gaming facility managers become entitled to repayment of privilege fees

1 paid to the state; and

2 WHEREAS, The current tax structure for racetracks needs to be 3 aligned with that of the casinos in order to allow the racetracks to open and 4 operate as intended.

Now, therefore:

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6 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

7 New Section 1. (a) Prior to any lottery gaming facility manager, 8 racetrack gaming facility manager or facility owner licensee paying any 9 prize requiring the completion of an internal revenue service form W-2G, 10 the manager or licensee shall cause the person winning the prize to be matched against the state debtor files maintained by the director of 11 12 accounts and reports as prescribed under K.S.A. 75-6201 et seq., and 13 amendments thereto. If such person is listed in the state debtor files, the prize shall be withheld by the lottery gaming facility manager, racetrack 14 15 gaming facility manager or the facility owner licensee to the extent of such person's debt as set forth in the state debtor files. 16

17 (b) The lottery gaming facility manager, racetrack gaming facility 18 manager and facility owner licensee shall not be subject to any civil, 19 criminal or administrative liability for any actions taken pursuant to this 20 section, unless such actions are intentional, malicious or wanton by such 21 lottery gaming facility manager, racetrack gaming facility manager, facility 22 owner licensee or employees or agents thereof. The sole remedy at law for 23 any person who claims that a prize was wrongfully withheld pursuant to 24 this section shall be to submit an appeal to the department of 25 administration pursuant to K.S.A. 75-6201 et seq., and amendments 26 thereto.

(c) Moneys withheld, based on the state debtor files, shall be remitted
to the state treasurer in accordance with K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments
thereto. The state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in the state
treasury and credit it to the department of administration's setoff clearing
fund.

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(d) As used in this section:

(1) "Facility owner licensee" shall have the same meaning as that
term is defined in K.S.A. 74-8802, and amendments thereto.

(2) "Racetrack gaming facility manager" shall have the same meaning
as that term is defined in K.S.A. 74-8702, and amendments thereto.

(3) "Lottery gaming facility manager" shall have the same meaning asthat term is defined in K.S.A. 74-8702, and amendments thereto.

(4) "Prize" shall have the same meaning as that term is defined in
K.S.A. 74-8702, and amendments thereto, and any winnings from
parimutuel wagering as provided by the Kansas parimutuel racing act in
K.S.A. 74-8801 et seq., and amendments thereto.

43 (e) Nothing in this section shall apply to Native American tribal

1 gaming facilities.

2 (f) This section shall be a part of and supplemental to the state debtor 3 setoff program.

4 New Sec. 2. (a) Notwithstanding the provisions of K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 5 74-8733, and amendments thereto, the attorney general may file an action 6 in quo warranto in the supreme court within 90 days from the effective 7 date of this act on the question of the authority of a public official to act in 8 accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 74-8743, and 9 amendments thereto. Such action may not be filed by any party except the 10 attorney general and shall only be filed in the supreme court.

(b) No action against the state of Kansas for specific performance, 11 12 anticipatory breach or breach of contract, the basis of which is that a racetrack gaming facility management contract violates the provisions of 13 K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 74-8734(h)(19) or 74-8741(c)(4), and amendments 14 15 thereto, or that such racetrack gaming facility management contract creates 16 a material breach of the lottery gaming facility manager's gaming facility 17 management contract, shall be deemed to have accrued until such date as 18 the Kansas lottery enters into a racetrack gaming facility management 19 contract for the placement of electronic gaming machines at a parimutuel 20 licensee location in any Kansas gaming zone, or such date a final order is 21 issued in any action brought by the attorney general pursuant to subsection 22 (a), whichever occurs later. Any such action shall be commenced in the 23 district court of Shawnee county within 60 days from the date the cause of 24 action accrued.

(c) No claim for equitable relief, including injunctive relief, may be
 brought in any action filed pursuant to this section except by the attorney
 general in an action brought under subsection (a).

28 (d) No claim arising from the execution of a racetrack gaming facility 29 management contract may be brought except by the lottery gaming facility manager for the lottery gaming facility located in the same Kansas gaming 30 31 zone as the racetrack gaming facility that is the subject of such racetrack 32 gaming facility management contract. No claim arising from the operation 33 of K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 74-8743, and amendments thereto, may be brought 34 except by the lottery gaming facility manager for the lottery gaming 35 facility located in the south central Kansas gaming zone.

(e) The monetary damages that may be awarded in any action brought
pursuant to this section shall not exceed an amount equal to the privilege
fee paid by the lottery gaming facility manager plus accrued interest from
the date such action accrues as specified in subsection (b).

(f) If an action is commenced in accordance with subsection (b), the
racetrack gaming facility manager that is a party to such racetrack gaming
facility management contract shall indemnify and hold harmless the state
of Kansas, the Kansas lottery and any other state agency named as a party

in such action against any and all liability the state or any such stateagency may have in such action.

3 (g) For purposes of this section, the Kansas expanded lottery act and 4 the Kansas parimutuel racing act, a racetrack gaming facility manager, as 5 defined in K.S.A. 74-8702, and amendments thereto, may also be a facility 6 owner licensee, as defined in K.S.A. 74-8802, and amendments thereto.

7 (h) The provisions of this section shall be a part of and supplemental8 to the Kansas expanded lottery act.

9 New Sec. 3. On or before December 1, 2018, and each December 1 10 thereafter, the official breed registering agencies for both horse and 11 greyhound breeds, as designated by the Kansas racing and gaming 12 commission in K.S.A. 74-8830 and 74-8832, and amendments thereto, 13 shall make recommendations to the Kansas racing and gaming commission 14 for implementation of programs that will maximize the benefit to 15 economic development in rural Kansas.

16 New Sec. 4. There is hereby established in the state treasury the Kansas horse council fund, which shall be administered by the Kansas 17 18 racing and gaming commission. All expenditures from this fund shall be 19 made in accordance with appropriation acts upon warrants of the director 20 of accounts and reports issued pursuant to vouchers approved by the 21 executive director of the Kansas racing and gaming commission. The 22 moneys credited to this fund shall be used for the development, promotion 23 and representation of the equine industry in Kansas and shall be distributed 24 to the Kansas horse council by contract with the Kansas racing and gaming 25 commission for these purposes.

26 Sec. 5. K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 74-8702 is hereby amended to read as 27 follows: 74-8702. As used in the Kansas lottery act, unless the context 28 otherwise requires:

(a) "Ancillary lottery gaming facility operations" means additional
non-lottery facility game products and services not owned and operated by
the state which may be included in the overall development associated
with the lottery gaming facility. Such operations may include, but are not
limited to, restaurants, hotels, motels, museums or entertainment facilities.

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(b) "Commission" means the Kansas lottery commission.

35 (c) "Electronic gaming machine" means electronic, any 36 electromechanical, video or computerized device, contrivance or machine 37 authorized by the Kansas lottery which, upon insertion of cash, tokens, 38 electronic cards or any consideration, is available to play, operate or 39 simulate the play of a game authorized by the Kansas lottery pursuant to 40 the Kansas expanded lottery act, including, but not limited to, bingo, poker, blackjack, keno and slot machines, and which may deliver or entitle 41 the player operating the machine to receive cash, tokens, merchandise or 42 43 credits that may be redeemed for cash. Electronic gaming machines may

 use bill validators and may be single-position reel-type, single or multigame video and single-position multi-game video electronic game, including, but not limited to, poker, blackjack and slot machines.
 Electronic gaming machines shall be directly linked to a central computer at a location determined by the executive director for purposes of security, monitoring and auditing.

7 (d) "Executive director" means the executive director of the Kansas8 lottery.

9 (e) "Gaming equipment" means any electric, electronic, computerized 10 or electromechanical machine, mechanism, supply or device or any other 11 equipment, which is: (1) Unique to the Kansas lottery and used pursuant to 12 the Kansas lottery act;-and (2) integral to the operation of an electronic 13 gaming machine or lottery facility game; and (3) affects the results of an 14 electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game by determining win or 15 loss.

16 (f) "Gaming zone" means: (1) The northeast Kansas gaming zone, 17 which consists of Wyandotte county; (2) the southeast Kansas gaming 18 zone, which consists of Crawford and Cherokee counties; (3) the south 19 central Kansas gaming zone, which consists of Sedgwick and Sumner 20 counties; and (4) the southwest Kansas gaming zone, which consists of 21 Ford county.

(g) "Gray machine" means any mechanical, electro-mechanical or electronic device, capable of being used for gambling, that is: (1) Not authorized by the Kansas lottery; (2) not linked to a lottery central computer system; (3) available to the public for play; or (4) capable of simulating a game played on an electronic gaming machine or any similar gambling game authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act.

(h) "Kansas lottery" means the state agency created by this act tooperate a lottery or lotteries pursuant to this act.

(i) "Lottery" or "state lottery" means the lottery or lotteries operated
 pursuant to this act.

(j) "Lottery facility games" means any electronic gaming machines
and any other games which, as of January 1, 2007, are authorized to be
conducted or operated at a tribal gaming facility, as defined in K.S.A. 749802, and amendments thereto, located within the boundaries of this state.

(k) "Lottery gaming enterprise" means an entertainment enterprise which includes a lottery gaming facility authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act and ancillary lottery gaming facility operations that have a coordinated business or marketing strategy. A lottery gaming enterprise shall be designed to attract to its lottery gaming facility consumers who reside outside the immediate area of such enterprise.

42 (l) "Lottery gaming facility" means that portion of a building used for 43 the purposes of operating, managing and maintaining lottery facility 1 games.

"Lottery gaming facility expenses" means normal business 2 (m) expenses, as defined in the lottery gaming facility management contract, 3 associated with the ownership and operation of a lottery gaming facility. 4

(n) "Lottery gaming facility management contract" means a contract, 5 6 subcontract or collateral agreement between the state and a lottery gaming 7 facility manager for the management of a lottery gaming facility, the 8 business of which is owned and operated by the Kansas lottery, negotiated and signed by the executive director on behalf of the state. 9

(o) "Lottery gaming facility manager" means a corporation, limited 10 liability company, resident Kansas American Indian tribe or other business 11 entity authorized to construct and manage, or manage alone, pursuant to a 12 lottery gaming facility management contract with the Kansas lottery, and 13 14 on behalf of the state, a lottery gaming enterprise and lottery gaming 15 facility.

16 "Lottery gaming facility revenues" means the total revenues from (p) 17 lottery facility games at a lottery gaming facility after all related prizes are 18 paid.

19 (q) (1) "Lottery machine" means any machine or device that allows a 20 player to insert cash or other form of consideration and may deliver as the result of an element of chance, regardless of the skill required by the 21 22 player, a prize or evidence of a prize, including, but not limited to:

(A) Any machine or device in which the prize or evidence of a prize 23 is determined by both chance and the player's or players' skill, including, 24 25 but not limited to, any machine or device on which a lottery game or lottery games, such as poker or blackjack, are played; 26

27 (B) any machine or device in which the prize or evidence of a prize is 28 determined only by chance, including, but not limited to, any slot machine 29 or bingo machine: or

30 (C) any lottery ticket vending machine, such as a keno ticket vending machine, pull-tab vending machine or an instant-bingo vending machine. 31 (2) "Lottery machine" shall not mean:

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33 (A) Any food vending machine defined by K.S.A. 36-501, and 34 amendments thereto;

35 (B) any nonprescription drug machine authorized under K.S.A. 65-36 650, and amendments thereto;

37 (C) any machine which dispenses only bottled or canned soft drinks, 38 chewing gum, nuts or candies;

39 (D) any machine excluded from the definition of gambling devices under subsection (d) of K.S.A. 21-4302, prior to its repeal, or K.S.A. 2017 40 41 Supp. 21-6403, and amendments thereto; or

(E) any electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game operated 42 43 in accordance with the provisions of the Kansas expanded lottery act.

1 (r) "Lottery retailer" means any person with whom the Kansas lottery 2 has contracted to sell lottery tickets or shares, or both, to the public.

3 (s) (1) "Major procurement" means any gaming product or service, 4 including, but not limited to, facilities, advertising and promotional 5 services, annuity contracts, prize payment agreements, consulting services, 6 equipment, tickets and other products and services unique to the Kansas 7 lottery, but not including materials, supplies, equipment and services 8 common to the ordinary operations of state agencies.

9 (2) "Major procurement" shall not mean any product, service or other 10 matter covered by or addressed in the Kansas expanded lottery act or a 11 lottery gaming facility management contract or racetrack gaming facility 12 management contract executed pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery 13 act.

(t) "Net electronic gaming machine income" means all cash or other
 consideration utilized to play an electronic gaming machine operated at a
 racetrack gaming facility, less all cash or other consideration paid out to
 winning players as prizes.

(u) "Organization licensee" has the meaning provided by K.S.A. 74-8802, and amendments thereto.

(v) "Parimutuel licensee" means a facility owner licensee or facility
 manager licensee under the Kansas parimutuel racing act.

(w) "Parimutuel licensee location" means a racetrack facility, as
defined in K.S.A. 74-8802, and amendments thereto, owned or managed
by the parimutuel licensee. A parimutuel licensee location may include any
existing structure at such racetrack facility or any structure that may be
constructed on real estate where such racetrack facility is located.

(x) "Person" means any natural person, association, limited liabilitycompany, corporation or partnership.

(y) "Prize" means any prize paid directly by the Kansas lottery
 pursuant to the Kansas lottery act or the Kansas expanded lottery act or
 any rules and regulations adopted pursuant to either act.

(z) "Progressive electronic game" means a game played on an
 electronic gaming machine for which the payoff increases uniformly as the
 game is played and for which the jackpot, determined by application of a
 formula to the income of independent, local or interlinked electronic
 gaming machines, may be won.

(aa) "Racetrack gaming facility" means that portion of a parimutuel
licensee location where electronic gaming machines are operated,
managed and maintained.

(bb) "Racetrack gaming facility management contract" means an
agreement between the Kansas lottery and a racetrack gaming facility
manager, negotiated and signed by the executive director on behalf of the
state, for placement of electronic gaming machines owned and operated by

1 the state at a racetrack gaming facility.

2 (cc) "Racetrack gaming facility manager" means a parimutuel
3 licensee specifically certified by the Kansas lottery to become a certified
4 racetrack gaming facility manager and offer electronic gaming machines
5 for play at the racetrack gaming facility.

6 (dd) "Returned ticket" means any ticket which was transferred to a 7 lottery retailer, which was not sold by the lottery retailer and which was 8 returned to the Kansas lottery for refund by issuance of a credit or 9 otherwise.

(ee) "Share" means any intangible manifestation authorized by the
Kansas lottery to prove participation in a lottery game, except as provided
by the Kansas expanded lottery act.

(ff) "Similar gaming facility" means that portion of a building used for the purposes of operating, managing and maintaining lottery facility games and other games authorized to be conducted or operated at tribal gaming facilities, as defined in K.S.A. 74-8902, and amendments thereto, located within the boundaries of this state, except the term "similar gaming facility" shall not include any facility authorized to operate, manage and maintain only electronic gaming machines.

23 (gg)(hh) "Token" means a representative of value, of metal or other 24 material, which is not legal tender, redeemable for cash only by the issuing 25 lottery gaming facility manager or racetrack gaming facility manager and 26 which is issued and sold by a lottery gaming facility manager or racetrack 27 gaming facility manager for the sole purpose of playing an electronic 28 gaming machine or lottery facility game.

(hh)(ii) "Vendor" means any person who has entered into a major
 procurement contract with the Kansas lottery.

31 (ii)(jj) "Video lottery machine" means any electronic video game 32 machine that, upon insertion of cash, is available to play or simulate the 33 play of a video game authorized by the commission, including, but not 34 limited to, bingo, poker, black jack and keno, and which uses a video 35 display and microprocessors and in which, by chance, the player may 36 receive free games or credits that can be redeemed for cash.

Sec. 6. K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 74-8741 is hereby amended to read as
follows: 74-8741. (a) The executive director of the Kansas lottery shall
negotiate a racetrack gaming facility management contract to place
electronic gaming machines at one parimutuel licensee location in each
gaming zone except the southwest Kansas gaming zone.

42 (b) To be eligible to enter into a racetrack gaming facility 43 management contract the prospective racetrack gaming facility manager

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1 shall, at a minimum:

(1) Have sufficient access to financial resources to support the
 activities required of a racetrack gaming facility manager under the Kansas
 expanded lottery act; and

5 (2) be current in filing all applicable tax returns and in payment of all 6 taxes, interest and penalties owed to the state of Kansas and any taxing 7 subdivision where such prospective manager is located in the state of 8 Kansas, excluding items under formal appeal pursuant to applicable 9 statutes.

10 11 (c) A racetrack gaming facility management contract shall include:(1) The term of the contract:

12 (2) provisions for the Kansas racing and gaming commission to oversee all racetrack gaming facility operations, including, but not limited 13 to: Oversight of internal controls; oversight of security of facilities; 14 performance of background investigations, determination of qualifications 15 16 and any required certification or licensing of officers, directors, board 17 members, employees, contractors and agents of the racetrack gaming 18 facility manager; auditing of net electronic gaming machine income and 19 maintenance of the integrity of electronic gaming machine operations;

(3) provisions for the racetrack gaming facility manager to pay the
costs of oversight and regulation of the racetrack gaming facility manager
under this act and such manager's racetrack gaming facility operations by
the *Kansas lottery and the* Kansas racing and gaming commission; and

24 (4) enforceable provisions: (A) Prohibiting the state, until July 1, 25 2032, from: (i) Entering into management contracts for more than three four lottery gaming facilities or similar gaming facilities, one to be located 26 27 in the northeast Kansas gaming zone, one to be located in the south central 28 Kansas gaming zone-and, one to be located in the southeast Kansas 29 gaming zone; and one to be located in the southwest Kansas gaming zone; 30 (ii) designating additional areas of the state where operation of lottery 31 gaming facilities or similar gaming facilities would be authorized; or (iii) 32 operating an aggregate of more than 2,800 electronic gaming machines at 33 all parimutuel licensee locations; and (B) requiring the state to repay to the 34 racetrack gaming facility manager an amount equal to the privilege fee 35 paid by such racetrack gaming facility manager, plus interest on such 36 amount, compounded annually at the rate of 10%, if the state violates the 37 prohibition provision described in (A); and

(5) provisions for the distribution of the net electronic gaming
machine income from the racetrack gaming facility, which shall be in
accordance with K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 74-8747, and amendments thereto.

(d) Racetrack gaming facility management contracts authorized bythis section may include provisions relating to:

43 (1) Accounting procedures to determine net electronic gaming

1 machine income, unclaimed prizes and credits;

(2) minimum requirements for a racetrack gaming facility manager to
 provide qualified oversight, security and supervision of electronic gaming
 machines including the use of qualified personnel with experience in
 applicable technology;

6 (3) eligibility requirements for employees, contractors or agents of a 7 racetrack gaming facility manager who will have responsibility for or 8 involvement with electronic gaming machines or for the handling of cash 9 or tokens;

10 (4) background investigations to be performed by the Kansas racing 11 and gaming commission;

(5) credentialing or certification requirements of any employee,
contractor or agent as provided by the Kansas expanded lottery act or rules
and regulations adopted pursuant thereto;

15 (6) provision for termination of the management contract by either 16 party for cause; and

(7) any other provision deemed necessary by the parties, including
such other terms and restrictions as necessary to conduct racetrack gaming
facility operations in a legal and fair manner.

20 (e) A person who is the manager of a lottery gaming facility in a
21 gaming zone shall not be eligible to be the manager of the racetrack
22 gaming facility in the same zone.

(f) A racetrack gaming facility management contract shall not
constitute property, nor shall it be subject to attachment, garnishment or
execution, nor shall it be alienable or transferable, except upon approval
by the executive director, nor shall it be subject to being encumbered or
hypothecated.

28 Sec. 7. K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 74-8743 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-8743. (a) The board of county commissioners of each county 29 where there is a an existing or former parimutuel licensee location by 30 resolution-shall may submit to the qualified voters of the county a 31 proposition to permit the placement of electronic gaming machines in the 32 county as provided in this section, or, upon presentation of a valid petition 33 signed by not fewer than 5,000 qualified voters of the county, shall submit 34 such proposition to the qualified voters of the county. The proposition shall 35 be submitted to the voters at a special election called by the board of 36 37 county commissioners for that purpose and held not more than 180 days

38 after the effective date of this act.

(b) (1) Upon the adoption of a resolution calling for an election
pursuant to this section, or the submission of a petition, which the county
election officer has determined has been signed by a sufficient number of
qualified voters of the county: (A) Except for Sedgwick county, the county
election officer shall cause the following proposition to be placed on the

1 ballot at the election called for that purpose: "Shall the Kansas Lottery be 2 authorized to place electronic gaming machines in county?": or (B) if the election is to be held in Sedgwick county, then the county 3 4 election officer shall cause the following proposition to be placed on the ballot at the election called for that purposes: "Shall the operation of 5 6 electronic gaming machines by the Kansas Lottery be authorized to place 7 electronic gaming machines in county at Wichita Greyhound 8 Park in Sedgwick county?"

9 (2) The proposition shall be submitted to the voters at the next 10 primary or general election, or at a special election called by the board of 11 county commissioners for that purpose. In no event shall the election be 12 held more than 120 days after the petition, if any, is deemed valid or 13 adoption of the resolution.

(c) If a majority of the votes cast and counted at such election is in 14 favor of approving the placement of electronic gaming machines in the 15 16 county, the Kansas lottery may place and operate electronic gaming 17 machines at a parimutuel licensee location in the county, subject to the 18 provisions of this act. If a majority of the votes cast and counted at an 19 election under this section is against permitting placement of electronic gaming machines in the county, the Kansas lottery shall not place or 20 21 operate electronic gaming machines at a parimutuel licensee location in 22 the county. The county election officer shall transmit a copy of the 23 certification of the results of the election to the executive director.

(d) The election provided for by this section shall be conducted, and
the votes counted and canvassed, in the manner provided by law for
question submitted elections of the county.

(2) If a simulcasting licensee has a license to conduct live greyhound races and the *simulcasting* licensee displays a simulcast greyhound race, breakage and unclaimed winning ticket proceeds shall be distributed in the manner provided by K.S.A. 74-8821 and 74-8822, and amendments thereto, for breakage and unclaimed winning ticket proceeds from live greyhound races.

40 (3) If a simulcasting licensee has a license to conduct live racing of 41 only horses and the *simulcasting* licensee displays a simulcast greyhound 42 race, unclaimed winning ticket proceeds shall be distributed in the manner 43 provided by K.S.A. 74-8822, and amendments thereto, for unclaimed winning ticket proceeds from live greyhound races. Breakage for such
 races shall be distributed for use to benefit greyhound racing as determined
 by the commission.

4 (4) If a simulcasting licensee has a license to conduct live racing of 5 only greyhounds and the *simulcasting* licensee displays a simulcast horse 6 race: (A) All breakage proceeds shall be remitted by the licensee to the 7 commission not later than the 15th day of the month following the race 8 from which the breakage is derived and the commission shall remit any such proceeds received to the state treasurer in accordance with the 9 provisions of K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments thereto. Upon receipt of 10 each such remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in 11 the state treasury to the credit of the Kansas horse breeding development 12 fund created by K.S.A. 74-8829, and amendments thereto; and (B) all 13 unclaimed ticket proceeds shall be remitted by the licensee to the 14 15 commission on the 61st day after the end of the calendar year and the 16 commission shall remit any such proceeds received to the state treasurer in accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments 17 18 thereto. Upon receipt of each such remittance, the state treasurer shall 19 deposit the entire amount in the state treasury to the credit of the Kansas 20 horse breeding development fund created by K.S.A. 74-8829, and 21 amendments thereto.

(i) The commission may approve a request by two or more
 simulcasting licensees to combine wagering pools within the state of
 Kansas pursuant to rules and regulations adopted by the commission.

(j) (1) The commission may authorize any simulcasting licensee to
 participate in an interstate combined wagering pool with one or more other
 racing jurisdictions.

(2) If a licensee participates in an interstate pool, the licensee may
adopt the takeout of the host jurisdiction or facility. The amount and
manner of paying purses from the takeout in an interstate pool shall be as
provided by subsection (g).

32 (3) The tax imposed on amounts wagered in an interstate pool shall 33 be as provided by K.S.A. 74-8823, and amendments thereto. Parimutuel 34 taxes may not be imposed on any amounts wagered in an interstate 35 combined wagering pool other than amounts wagered within this 36 jurisdiction.

(4) Breakage for interstate combined wagering pools shall be
calculated in accordance with the statutes and rules and regulations of the
host jurisdiction and shall be allocated among the participating
jurisdictions in a manner agreed to among the jurisdictions. Breakage
allocated to this jurisdiction shall be distributed as provided by subsection
(h).

(5) Upon approval of the respective recognized greyhound owners'

1 group or recognized horsemen's group, the commission may permit an organization licensee to simulcast to other racetrack facilities or off-track 2 3 wagering or intertrack wagering facilities in other jurisdictions one or 4 more races conducted by such licensee, use one or more races conducted 5 by such licensee for an intrastate combined wagering pool or use one or 6 more races conducted by such licensee for an interstate combined 7 wagering pool at off-track wagering or intertrack wagering locations 8 outside the commission's jurisdiction and may allow parimutuel pools in other jurisdictions to be combined with parimutuel pools in the 9 commission's jurisdiction for the purpose of establishing an interstate 10 combined wagering pool. 11

12 (6) The participation by a simulcasting licensee in a combined 13 interstate wagering pool does not cause that licensee to be considered to be 14 doing business in any jurisdiction other than the jurisdiction in which the 15 licensee is physically located.

(k) If the organization licensee, facility owner licensee if any and the
recognized horsemen's group or recognized greyhound owners' group are
unable to agree concerning a simulcasting application, the matter may be
submitted to the commission for determination at the written request of
any party in accordance with rules and regulations of the commission.

(1) This section shall be part of and supplemental to the Kansasparimutuel racing act.
