Re: **Joint proponent testimony on Substitute for SB 34, requiring review of administrative rules and regulations every five years.**

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Chairman Barker and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of Substitute for SB 34. This testimony is submitted jointly by the Kansas Grain and Feed Association (KGFA), Kansas Agribusiness Retailers Association (KARA), and Renew Kansas Biofuels Association.

KGFA is the state association of the grain receiving, storage, processing and shipping industry in Kansas. KGFA's membership represents 99% of the commercially licensed grain storage in the state. KARA is a trade association of over 700 agribusiness firms that supply fertilizers, crop protection products, seed, petroleum products, and agronomic services to Kansas farmers. Renew Kansas is the trade association of the Kansas biofuels industry.

Broadly, members of these associations operate in agribusiness industries which are both important to the state of Kansas and highly-regulated. Members of our associations support state and federal regulations that are necessary, reasonable, and lawful. However, we have long opposed the adoption of regulations on industry which are unnecessary or unreasonable as to scope or cost of implementation.

Each executive branch agency is created by the state legislature – as is the agency's scope of regulatory authority. Because regulations have the full force and effect of law, the process of adopting regulations should be deliberate and fully transparent to the regulated industry.

As all authority to create law rests in the legislative branch of government, the Kansas Legislature should maintain final lawful authority to review and approve, or deny, the adoption of any rule or regulation proposed by an executive agency. This regulatory review authority reflects the separation of powers within our state constitution, and is consistent with how our state, and others, viewed agency regulatory authority for many years.

This bill seeks to introduce positive changes to the regulatory system in Kansas by providing regular oversight of agency regulations by Legislators directly elected by the residents of Kansas. It also provides agencies a more streamlined approach to repealing regulations that are no longer deemed necessary.

For the reasons stated, we stand in strong support of Substitute for Senate Bill 34 and would ask this committee to pass the measure out favorably.
