

**Testimony before Senate Commerce Committee
Senate Bill 179- employment requirements in state contracts
Presented by Eric Stafford, Senior Director of Government Affairs**

Madam Chairman and members of the committee:

My name is Eric Stafford. I am the Senior Director of Government Affairs for the Kansas Chamber. Thank you for the opportunity to speak to you today in opposition to Senate Bill 179.

SB 179 establishes a new requirement for companies seeking to obtain state contracts and certain tax incentives that at least 70% of the employees assigned by the company on the project must be Kansas workers.

While the goal of this legislation might be to create jobs for Kansans, this bill could have the opposite effect. Businesses looking to establish a presence in our state with headquarters (and majority of their workforce) out of state would not be eligible for state contracts or tax incentives under the provisions in SB 179.

We oppose legislation which places mandates on businesses such as those included in SB 179 instead of allowing free market competition for all companies seeking state contracts. In order to be competitive in today's market, Kansas must offer economic development incentives such as the PEAK program which would also fall under the 70% requirement under this bill. We have seen the effectiveness of those programs this year where numerous companies located in Kansas City, Missouri have relocated to Kansas to take advantage of the savings. Another example would be the MARS plant announced last year in Topeka where company representatives stated the benefits offered by the state were a significant factor in the decision process by the company on the location for their new facility.

In conclusion, these incentive programs are essential to attract new businesses to Kansas. A new requirement for eligibility requiring a certain percentage of Kansas workers simply makes no sense and will not lead to job growth for Kansas.
