SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for HB 2595 by Representatives Hodge and Schroeder

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 2595 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

HB 2595 would repeal the crime of unlawfully placing or receiving a child from another state and the related penalty of imprisonment in the county jail for up to 30 days and fine of \$5 to \$100. The bill would also amend references relating to who is responsible for listing tangible personal property for purposes of ad valorem property tax assessment. Various words and phrases found in current law relating to individuals affected by a mental illness or affected by an intellectual or developmental impairment would be amended to reflect up-to-date terminology.

The Kansas Association of Counties, the Department of Revenue, the Office of the Attorney General and the Department for Children and Families indicate enactment of HB 2595 would have no fiscal effect.

The Office of Judicial Administration indicates enactment of HB 2595 could have a fiscal effect on the courts. Removing the crime of unlawfully placing or receiving a child from another state found in existing statute would remove any fines and fees collected from such cases. Any fiscal effect associated with HB 2595 is not reflected in *The FY 2019 Governor's Budget Report*.
